



THE CUTWORK BORDER.



opening. Add the large collar, or, if this is not to be used, simply bind the neck with silk or any other material. Now make the sleeve by sewing the seam as notched and add the cuff, double "oo" perforations and seams even. For the skirt, close the seam as notched. Pleat, bringing "T" to corresponding double small "oo" perforations and taok. Turn under front edge on slot perforations. Close center-back seam. Center-front indicated by line of double "oo" perforations. Front of tunic indicated by large "O" perforatunic indicated by large "O" perfora-tions; adjust on skirt, upper edges even, single large "O" perforations at seam. Pleat skirt, creasing on slot per-forations, bring folded edges to cor-responding lines of small "o" perfora-tions in tunic and skirt, and stitch. Lap right front edge of skirt on left. centers even and stitch. leaving edges free above large "O" perforation for placket, and if desired, allow lower part to hang free below triple "ooo" per-forations. Sew to lower edge of waist,

over stay, centers even. The neck is pretty left entirely bar of the shield and finished with a ruffle of net, shadow lace or chiffon.
