CANADA'S EXPORT OF PAPER WILL INCREASE

This is the Only Country Not, Affected by War With Surplus

New York, Sept. 1-A representative of one of the largest paper manufac-turers has received a cable reporting a dearth of sulphite pulp on the continent. Quotations on wood pulp have advanced from 92 to 145 shillings per ton. On the outbreak of the war 20,000 tons of paper consigned to this country were on the sea. Of this amount, 20,000 tons had been sold, and the remainder not yet disposed of. The United States annually imports 350,000 tons.

France and Great Britain are be-

ginning to suffer, as the greater part of their paper comes from Germany and Scandinavia. With Germany eliminated, Scandinavia is left to supply both countries. As the Baltic Sea is normally open to commerce only between May and November, importers customarily lay in sufficient supply in the latter part of the summer to last for the year. The present is the season of lowest

supply.

With the Baltic blocked on account of the hostile fleets and with little hope of its being opened shortly, the shortage is being felt more and more each day. Some of the English publishers have already cut down the size of their South American publishers are feeling the stress too, as they also procure paper from Europe. This leaves Canada as the only producer that is not affected which has any surplus paper.

The people of Canada know at most of these things are being made by the manufacturers of this country. They do not know yet whether the manufacturers of Canada are going to serve them still more by making many of the

things that were formerly imported from Continental Europe.

The manufacturers of Canada should tell the people of Canada at his time more than ever, just what they are making and the merits of heir products. Let them drive home the facts through the great notern message medium—advertising. Let them use the newspapers o inform the people that they "have the goods." Let them explain

that notwithstanding the war the people of Canada CAN have "the pie"— home-made pie," and all the better for being home-made. And after the war is over-if not before-perhaps our neighbors in Europe will be coming to Canada for some of this "pie"—importing from Canada some of the things Canada now imports from them.
