Missouri Man in the City Speaks of Results of First Year

"We have had commission government in force in our city for the last year, and we are delighted with the results. The previous administrations had been running us into debt. This has been stopped and the civic accounts will show a surplus for this year. We have had better government, the administration of the department has been improved and any matter which requires prompt attention goes straight to the mayor. The commission has been able to get away from political influences which had hampered the old council and in every way has been a great improvement."

This is the opinion and experience of Herbert Mead of Missoula, Mont., who is here visiting his relatives and who has been the guest of his sister, Mrs. T. J. Flood of Dock street. Missoula is a town of 15,000 population and they have a mayor and two commissioners. They are paying the mayor \$3,000 and the commissioners \$2,500 a year.
