

St. Andrews-by-the-Sca, June 24--Unstinted praise of the highways of New Brunswick, and great credit to the Premier and Minister of Public Works, Hon. P. J. Veniot, for his suc-cess in that connection, were voiced by many speakers, at the formal open-ing of the eleventh Canadian Good Roads convention here this afternoon. Speakers from several of the Cana-dian provinees, who had driven over the New Brunswick roads on the way here, were very complimentary of their condition, and a particularly flattering tribute was paid to Hon. Mr. Veniot by A. W. Campbell. of Ottawa, Feder-al Commissioner of Highways, and popularly known as "Good Roads" Campbell, who declared New Bruns-wick had best gravel roads in Canada. The 'matter of Federal aid formed the principal subject of the evening session, during which Premier Veniot urged the convention to bring before the Dominion Government the necessity of continuing Federal aid in the con-struction of the Provincial highways. He asked that a strong delegation be sent to Ottawa to present the case on behalf of the provinces.
