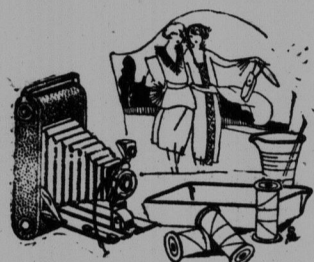

RABINOVITCH LOSES CASE IN HALIFAX COURT

Myer Chechik Gets \$309,009 Judgment in Liquor Controversy.

SAINT JOHN ANGLE AROUSED INTEREST

Rabinovitch Not on Hand, and Attachment Writ Issued.

An action commenced in the Halifax courts more than a year ago, arising out of a liquor concern partnership organized in Winnipeg in 1919, was settled in the Supreme Court there on Saturday, when Mr. Justice Rogers handed down a decision in the case of Myer Chechik versus Harry Rabinovitch. He found for Chechik, the plaintiff, to the amount of \$309,009.99. Rabinovitch had previously left for parts unknown, and a writ of attachment has been issued against him.

IN SAINT JOHN

A phase of this case occupied the courts in Saint John and created a great deal of interest, some of the leading legal talent in the city being engaged. Rabinovitch was placed under arrest, but the case was dismissed.

The case was one of the most involved that has ever engaged the attention of the Nova Scotia court. L. A. Loreti, K. C., represented the plaintiff throughout, while the defendant had been represented consecutively by L. A. Forsythe, W. Jones, J. L. Ralston, K. C., and John E. Read.

SOUGHT SETTLEMENT

The partnership broke up in 1922, when Chechik applied for a just settlement of their joint account. When the case came to court the non-appearance of the partnership books and the defendant complicated the situation. A part of the action involved the alleged misappropriation of \$50,000 cash allegedly by Rabinovitch a year ago, while proceedings were in progress in Halifax. It was just before a trial judge granted a writ of attachment against the defendant for failure to obey the order of the court to pay this sum into court, that Rabinovitch departed. He had previously resided in Saint John.

In the course of his judgment Saturday Mr. Justice Rogers said: "I cannot but conclude that the defendant's conduct throughout has been that of a fraudulent partner who has deliberately set out to deprive his associate of his just rights."

GIFTS PRESENTED

At First Presbyterian church, West Saint John, last evening after service the congregation met in the vestry and presented a silver basket filled with carnations, to Mr. and Mrs. Murray Long, as a token of appreciation for their services in the choir. Mr. Long is soloist and leader and Mrs. Long soprano soloist. Rev. W. McE. Matthews, pastor, made the presentation, with a short address of eulogy on the faithful work done by Mr. and Mrs. Long. A quartette composed of Messrs. M. W. Long, Percy Flewelling, Foster Powell and Ulysses Osborne also received tokens of appreciation. Rev. Mr. Matthews said that the success of the church services was dependent in a large degree upon the manner in which the music was conducted. He felt that he was expressing the opinion of his elders and officers, as well as of the congregation, when he praised the leader and his assistants for the good music they had provided in the last year.

BRINGS HOME IDEAS

Commissioner Harding Gets Fire Fighting and Building Tips in Chicago.

Commissioner W. L. Harding arrived home yesterday at noon after attending a convention of the National Fire Protection Association in Chicago. He reports that the meeting was most interesting and instructive and that he picked up ideas which he expects to make use of in his conduct of the safety department. He got ideas with respect to buildings which he hopes to have incorporated in the new building code and also on fire fighting and fire prevention. The commissioner was the only representative from the Maritime Provinces at the convention and he made known to all the beauties and advantages of this part of the continent from a scenic and industrial point of view.

Charge That Girl Stole Bicycle

An eleven-year-old girl, charged with the theft of a girl's bicycle from 107 Victoria street, pleaded not guilty to the charge before Magistrate Henderson in the Police Court this morning. After hearing the evidence of Miss E. Waters, owner of the bicycle, and Policeman McBrien, the hearing was set over until Friday morning. The mother of the young girl said that the bicycle was found under their doorstep and she thought her child had won it in a competition.

FIRST BEATTY GATHERING TO BE ON JUNE 22

Informal Opening With Banquet for Shareholders and Wives

FORMAL EVENT ON FOLLOWING NIGHT

Reception, Dinner and Ball on Program, Announces General Manager.

The informal opening of the Admiral Beatty Hotel here will take place Monday evening, June 22, at a banquet for the shareholders and their wives, according to George H. O'Neill, general manager of the Canadian system of the United Hotels Company, who arrived here today from Toronto to attend a meeting of the directors of the local hotel this afternoon. "We expect to have all our arrangements completed by then, with the hotel open for business," Mr. O'Neill said this morning. The formal opening, Mr. O'Neill declared, would be held on Tuesday night, June 23, with a reception, dinner and grand ball for which invitations would be in the mail next week. The list for these invitations now is being prepared.

NOT ALL DECIDED.

Details of the opening programmes, Mr. O'Neill said, had not been fully decided yet, but this would probably be done at a directors' meeting this afternoon. Among those who will attend will be Hon. A. J. Doolley, president of the United Hotels. Great progress has been made within the last few weeks at the hotel itself. Carpets now are being laid on the top floor, the elevators are running and furniture is rapidly moving in. The kitchen equipment is fully installed, giving the Admiral Beatty what is claimed to be the best equipped kitchen east of Montreal. Decorative painters also are rushing their work to completion.

THE STAFF.

In connection with the organization that will man the hotel, Mr. O'Neill announced this morning that the important part of the hotel system had been practically completed, and he was pleased to add that it was nearly 100 per cent. Canadian. Men from the civic public works department were at work this morning grading for the new sidewalk for the hotel.
