

Following this work in Sierra Leone, he was appointed manager of the Joint agency of the African & British African Royal Mail Shipping Company at Lagos, West Africa, and was made provisional member of the Legislative Council under the Governance in Colonel Sir J. Wilcox's despatches for embarkation services during the Ash anti war in 1900.

At the beginning of 1902 he retired from the Royal Naval Reserve with the rank of commander and returned to England to become marine superintendent of the Elder Dempster Company at Liverpool. When this company sold a number of steamers to the Canadian Pacific a year later, Captain Walsh went over with the vessels in a similar capacity.

TO CANADA: IN 1904.

He came to Canada in 1904 as superintendent in Montreal of the Canadian Pacific services. In 1910 he was appointed general marine superintendent and in 1918 assistant manager of the company's steamers.


