Montreal, Nov. 19.—The Borden government which made "No truck or trade with the Yankees" its war cry in 1911, has given another exhibition of its sham and humbug. It has been buying shalun and humbug. It is buying coal for the Intercolonial Railway in the United States.

The railway department has just purchased 25,000 tons of American coal which is to be delivered at Drummondville at a higher price than the C. N. is paying for coal from Nova Scotia mines. HOW YARMOUTH GETS BOOZE Yarmouth Times—Scott Act Inspector Durland, with officer Babine, visited the D. A. R. freight shed and took possession of quite a large quantity of booze. There were eight large barrels, one large packing case and two small boxes. These contained whiskey, rum gin, and bottled beer. "R. J. Slatery" leads in quantity addressed to him with "P. S. Finn" a close second. "Frank Carter" has only one barrel and "R. Munford" and "P. Rovine" similar quantities. This is the first liquor seizure made at a railway station in Yarmouth. The whole consignment was handed to the police office and will remain there until the authorities decide as to its disposal. The parties to whom the liquor is addressed are unknown in Yarmouth.

Digby Shipping News Digby, N. S., Nov. 19.—Schr Arthur J. Parker, Captain Smith, has finished loading her cargo of lumber at Digby for Boston and is now anchored in the stream ready to proceed.

Steamer Centreville, Captain Grahnam, has discharged a quantity of pickled fish in The Racquette from the wrecked schooner Theodore Roosevelt, for reshipment on board the schooner. The schooner E. M. Morrissey, loading fish at this port for Gloucester, sailed this afternoon with wrecking gear from Bear River to be used in raising the Roosevelt for the benefit of her owners.

Principal Provisions of Ontario's New Workmen's Compensation Law

(Toronto World) Compensation for injuries lasts as long as the disability. Railway companies will not contribute to the accident fund. Industrial diseases are put on the same footing as accidents. Employers must contribute towards the expense of administration. Employees are not unduly burdened by the provisions of the bill. The provincial government will make a substantial contribution to the compensation fund. A board will be appointed by the crown to take charge of the administration of the new law. Contributory negligence is no bar to compensation, but shall be taken into account in the settlement. The crown is not included in the bill, but will call on the board in case of accidents to government employees. Willful or serious conduct will mean that no compensation be paid unless death or serious disability results. Highly paid managers will not profit unwarrantably under the new law, as their compensation is limited to \$2,000 a year. No hard and fast rule is laid down regarding the reserve fund for compensation, this being left to the board to determine. The bill, as drafted by Sir William Meredith, is founded on the German law and is said to be the most up to date in the world. The common law, by which an employe takes upon himself risks incidental to his employment, is classed as unfair and is abolished. Telephone and navigation companies must commute weekly or periodical payments to their employes, and keep their workmen insured against accidents. Farming, wholesale and retail establishments, and domestic service are not included in the bill, but provision is made to bring them in when the board sees fit. The new law defends workmen against unscrupulous employers. No litigation will be necessary in order that an injured man receive compensation. The board's decision will be final, but the crown may state a case for an opinion from the appellate court.
