TRAP SHOOTING.
O. J. Killam Leads.
As a result of his shooting on Saturday last, O. J. Killam of the local Trap Shooting Club, led all Canada in competition for a place on the Olympic team which will shoot in Antwerp, July 22 to 31. Another who will probably make up the team is J. A. MacLaughlin of Halifax, who has a mark of 275 for the three trials. Mr. Killam made a run of 92 on Saturday, missing the ninety-third bird, and finished with a mark of 96, giving him a grand total of 296 for the trials. Mr. Killam and Mr. MacLaughlin, who competed in the first two trials, withdrew from the contest on Saturday. The local men will keep practicing and go to Ottawa for the Eastern Canada championships, which will take place June 15, 16 and 17. It is probable that at this time those who qualified for the Canadian Olympic team will have a shoot-off. The best man in this event, with the best in the Western championships, which took place at Moose Jaw, July 22, 23 and 24, will represent Canada at the Grand American Handicap at Cleveland, August 23 to 28.

The Challenger's Captain.
New York, May 25.—Captain W. P. Burton, master of the Shamrock IV, arrived here today from England aboard the Adriatic, accompanied by his wife. He said that he would go to City Island at once, to inspect his craft and stretch her sails. Captain Burton declared he already had completed in 999 races. Asked if his wife would accompany him on the thousandth one, as had been reported, he replied:

"Mrs. Burton has not missed any of the 999. You can draw your own conclusions."
His wife was described by him as one of the best yacht women in Europe. The skipper of the Shamrock IV, obtained a three months' leave of absence from his duties as a member of the Royal Yacht Commission, in order to handle the challenger yacht in the coming race.

MAN O' WAR IS UNDER SPECIAL BODYGUARD NIGHT AND DAY.
Samuel D. Riddle, owner of Man o' War, which won the Preakness and which is regarded as the most valuable horse in the country, is taking no chances of his highly prized colt being injured by persons who might wish to harm the animal. During his preparation for the Preakness Man o' War was guarded like a king. A bodyguard was placed at his stall and he was watched every hour of the day. The bodyguard consisted of four men, two to a shift. It is Mr. Riddle's intention to thus safeguard his colt throughout the season.

PLAN TO LET FANS SEE BOTH TITLE MEET AND RACE.
New York, May 21.—Those sport lovers who want to see both the intercollegiate track and field championships and the American Henley regatta, the two athletic events which will be held in Philadelphia on May 29, will have their wishes fulfilled, through a special arrangement entered into by the officials in charge of the two affairs. "As soon as the track games are finished on Franklin Field special rapid transit cars will be waiting to whisk the large throng to the Schuylkill river, a short distance away, in time to witness the beginning of the 'Varsity eight-oared race for the Stewards' Challenge Cup. The hour for beginning the two events has also been fixed so as to permit the carrying out of the arrangement."

Students at the Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh installed a radio transmitter in Central Hall to send out the music of an orchestra playing in the hall to scores of radio students in the district listening in. Prof. Rath, hearing the music in the experiment station of the university, half a mile away, succeeded by the use of a magnavox—an instrument to increase the sound from a radio receiver—and two strings of electric wire, in passing it on a half-mile to the Helms House, where students danced to it.
