MORNING NEWS

OVER THE WIRES

A schooner loading lumber near Ga-
getown for Reid Brothers, was struck by
lightning yesterday morning during a
storm which passed over that district.
Charles H. Jones of Gagetown received
a shock in the arm which affected him
for several hours.

Apple experts report that the crop in
Gagetown and Lower Gagetown will be
better than expected in July.

The Nicholson File Company of
Providence, Rhode Island, has posted a
notice announcing an advance of wages
of 16-23 per cent, commencing Septem-
ber 5 and full time work for its 1,200
employees.

The erection of a mill for the man-
ufacture of newsprint will be commenced
as soon as possible by the Bathurst
Company, Ltd., at Bathurst. It will
have a capacity of fifty tons a day and
later this will be doubled. About 150
men will be given employment.

The St. Croix Paper Company's new
lumber plant at Woodland Junction was
destroyed by fire on Wednesday with a
loss of \$150,000. The shed, office build-
ing and about 1,250,000 feet of lumber
were the only things saved.

The body of a young man was found
on Monday in the water near Wilson's
Beach, Campobello Island, by two young
men, Kenneth and Asa Brown, when
they were returning from fishing. The
body was identified as that of a young
man named Patterson, son of Robert
Patterson, a well known musician of
Eastport.

TRAFFIC SCOUTS DOING GOOD WORK

Are Aiding Effectively in
Protecting the Safety Zones
in Bangor.

(Bangor Commercial)
Efficient services is being given by
three shifts of boy scouts in assisting the
traffic policemen in regulating the heavy
ebb and flow of fair week traffic through
the newly instituted "safety zones." The
shifts, eight scouts in each, work for two
hours at a stretch and are then relieved.
Wednesday noon the scouts were

equipped with small megaphones with
which to instruct automobilists who were
coming too fast, as the boys' voices can-
not carry very far due to the noisy
traffic.

The members of the third shift went
on duty during the middle of the after-
noon and will be relieved late in the
afternoon by the first shift.
Two aspects of the fine work done by
the scouts are the preventing of parking
of cars in forbidden areas, and the guid-
ing of automobiles past electric cars.
Through the safety zones automobiles
may proceed past a car that is loading
or unloading passengers, providing the
machines go at a slow and careful pace.
The scouts regulate this kind of traffic
remarkably well for inexperienced boys.
A typically feminine opinion of the
scout traffic officer was expressed by two
women Wednesday noon, when they
said: "Aren't the scouts cute little
dears?" The masculine view of the
junior traffic policemen is that "the boys
are doing mighty well."

BREAK IN CABLE.

be exchanged for bonds of the new issue, in fully
registered, or coupon registered or coupon bearer form
of each year of the duration of the loan, the first interest
payment accruing and payable 1st May, 1923. Bonds
of the new issue will be sent to the banks for
delivery immediately after the receipt of the surrendered
bonds.

The bonds of the maturing issue which are not
converted under this proposal will be paid off in cash on
the 1st December, 1922.
