THE HUDBON'S BAY COMPANY .- The Hudson's Bay company is an old and time onored institution. Its original charter lates back to the time of CHARLES 11, and is over two hundred years old. During that period the Company has carried on a flourishing trade, has amassed an immence property, and has wielded a potent in fluence. Since the acqui, ition of the North-West territory by the Canadian Government, and the inauguration of a better system of administration and trade, the affairs of the Company have not proved so flourishing. It is at present, as shown by the report read at its recent annual meeting in London, in very depressed condition. The business of the Company is atterly at a standstill; the property of the Company is depreciating in the market; and the prospects for the future are not over-bright and encouraging. Such a state of things may excite sympathy; and there are those who will regret to see the Hudson's Bay Company drop out of existence. Yet it is itself obviously to blame for the present position of affairs; and unless it has the wisdom and courage to alter its tactics it will still more decline until it becomes of necessity defunct.
