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

Says Czar is a Poor, Weak Creature.

Believes Long Reign of Despotism is Surely Coming to Its End.

LONDON, Jan. 27.-George Meredith, the author, in the course of an interview given to the Chronicle yesterday, expressed a strong conviction that the "Long reign of despotism which blocks eastern Europe is slowly but surely ming to an end."

"The emperor is a poor, weak creature," said Mr. Meredith. "We must all pity him in his fall. He has no will of his own, but as for the grand dukes, they are the enemies of human kind. Nobody in the world will regret their disappearances. They are the real authors of the terrible events in now that it is the bureaucracy with the grand dukes at its head that rules Rusbut nothing, I can imagine, can now prevent the early downfall of the goverrment.
