FOURTH GAME

BOILING TO BOOM HERE THIS WINTER

Catholic Societies, at a Joint Meeting Held Last Night, Form New League—Much Interest is Shown.

That bowling has become one of the most popular indoor winter sports in the city was amply demonstrated last night when a large and representative meeting of the different Catholic societies in the I. L. and B. rooms, Union street, and a bowling league was organized and a schedule of games drawn up. Representatives were present from the Knights of Columbus, I. L. B. A. O. H. Holy Trinity, C. M. B. A. O. St. Peter's, St. Joseph's and St. John the Baptist.

Managers of the different teams will submit the names of eight players which they propose using during the season, and no player can be used by any club other than the names which have been submitted by the manager of the team.

All of last year's players are available, and besides there is some youngsters who will break into the league with the opening of the season. The league will last for twenty-one weeks, and as each team have strengthened their makeup considerably, some exciting contests are looked for.

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SPORTS BOWLING TO BOOM HERE THIS WINTER

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Detroit, Mich., Oct. 12.—Detroit defeated Pittsburgh, 5 to 0 today and evened up the count in the world's championship series, each team now having two victories to its credit. The game was played with the mercury at 34 degrees above zero, but 17,038 persons braved the chilling temperature and freezing blasts and the great majority felt well repaid.

The American League champions outclassed their rivals in every department of the game and the pitching of George Mullin will make one of the brightest bits in the baseball history of Detroit. It is hard to conceive of any pitcher having his double into the same place, sending D. Jones and Bush across the plate. Crawford ended the inning, Leifield to Abstein.

Mullin performed a feat in the third inning that will live long in the annals of baseball. He struck out the mighty Wagner with two out and men on second and third. That was a mighty feat but just previously he had struck out Manager Clarke, a hard hitter, with men on first and second. A double steal on Clarke's third strike moved the men to second and third where they died with Wagner. Leifield also was a victim on strikes in this game, giving Mullin three strike-outs in one session. All told, he struck out ten men.

So thoroughly did Mullin do his work that there were only six balls hit to the outfield. Three of these were safe and the other three were divided, two flies to Crawford and one to Cobb.

Pittsburgh threatened to score in the second and third innings. After being retired one, two, three, in the first inning, Wagner fanned. Deleahy then made the only error for Detroit when he fumbled Abstein's grounder and Wagner moved to second.

Pittsburgh's real opportunity to score came in the third inning but the stadium Mullin stopped them. Leifield made an inauspicious start by striking out, but Byrne hit a two bagger into the left field overflew and Leifield drew a base on balls. Clarke struck out, getting two. Only one of them, however, figured in the scoring.

The conclusive victory of Detroit has topped Pittsburgh from its proud position as the favorite in the betting and even money is now being offered on the Pittsburgh team.

The cold apparently affected Pittsburgh's feeling for more than it did that of Detroit. Six errors were charged to the Pittsburgh infield, Abstein, Miller and Phillippe each getting two. Only one of them, however, figured in the scoring.

The Michigan boys won again. Mullin's pitching was the most sensational in the annals of the great game. With two out and a man on second and third, he struck out the mighty Hans Wagner.

The only "Hans" failed to negotiate Mullin's curves yesterday, while the clever right fielder of the Tigers swung the leather safely for two clean singles.

Halifax followers of hockey are already talking of a key, and there are likely to be several changes on both local teams from last season. A number of people have already reserved their boxes for the season, and Manager Maher has had other applications.—Halifax Recorder.

Although St. John will be without a city league, football enthusiasts will have an opportunity of seeing the "kickers" perform on Saturday afternoon, when Stan Taylor's "Indians" will go on the war-path with the All-St. Johns, on whose line-up will appear the fastest pigskin booters in the city.

After all St. John is to have good senior football teams this fall. Some of the enthusiasts were not satisfied to have the season pass without some effort at organization and the formation of an All St. John team with Arthur Tully and Graham Paterson as the prime movers has introduced a new element in the situation.

There are now two teams, the Algonquins and All St. Johns and if arrangements can be made with the intermediate teams a game will be pulled off on Saturday on the Victoria grounds. The Michigan and Y. M. C. A. have secured the grounds for an interesting contest but probably a double header will be arranged and the spectators given the full worth of their money. Bedford's Confession

In Kinrade Murder

Continued on Page 1. Bedford's confession in the Kinrade murder case is a revelation. He was working around the docks in Toronto, where he met a man who, after a short acquaintance asked if he wanted to make some money. Bedford says he expressed his wish for such an opportunity whereupon the stranger told him that he was in love with a Hamilton girl, but she had thrown him over, and he would give Bedford \$500 if he would kill the girl.

Bedford agreed to the proposition and they went to Hamilton, where he claims he committed the deed. Kydd says that Bedford's description does not tally at all with that given by Miss Florence Kinrade of the man, but he says that Bedford told him that the man stood in the door with him while he fired the shot and the description Bedford gives of this man, Kydd says, agrees with that given by Miss Kinrade.

Bedford was charged today in the Bow Street court on his own confession, with the murder of Ethel Kinrade, at Hamilton, Ont., and remanded for a week to allow inquiries to be made into several peculiar features of the case.

Bedford is six feet tall and of clear-cut features, slim built, fair hair, blue eyes. He gave his age as 21. His answers to the magistrate were clear and decisive.

In confessing to Superintendent Forest, Bedford said: "I committed a murder in Hamilton, Canada last year by shooting Miss Kinrade, and I have come to give myself up, as I cannot stand the worry of it any longer."

Bedford afterwards put the confession in writing taking ten foolscap pages to tell his story. His statement was not read in court.

The confession contains a wealth of circumstantial detail. He said that he could remember the whole matter, but he could not remember the last fair offered in the summer of last year. The man he met in Toronto was about 33 or 34 years of age, five feet seven inches tall, of medium build, ginger hair, heavy drooping moustache of fair hair. The stranger said:

"If you can keep all secrets you will learn in the next few days I will pay you well."

Bedford replied: "I am quite ready to do anything if there is money in it."
