this week.

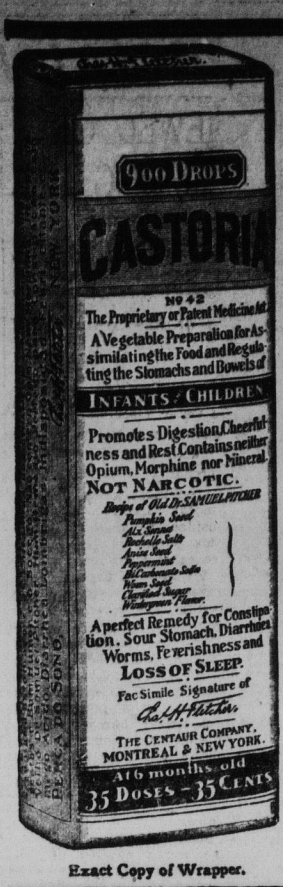
The wheat crop in this vicinity this
