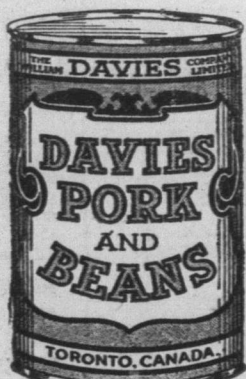

on the part of the West that it would  
no longer allow itself to be domi-  
nated by the East. What was to be  
the outcome?

It was said that the Liberal Gov-  
ernment did nothing; that it had  
merely carried on the National Policy.  
If Liberals made no change in the  
tariff, how did it happen that the  
leader of the Conservative part at-  
tacked the Liberal tariff so bitterly  
and declared that it would ruin the  
industries of the country?

Must Have Party.  
"You cannot do anything," Mr.  
Fielding declared, "under our system  
of government, except by one of the  
other great parties." The farmers  
were going to play a lone hand. They  
might have some fun in playing it,  
but they would never take a trick.

Here Dr. Clark, of Red Deer,  
interrupted:  
"May I suggest," he said, "that  
Cobden is a case to the contrary?"  
Mr. Fielding: "If my honorable  
friend can tell me how an independent  
member can get any important meas-  
ure through this House without the  
intervention and support of the Gov-  
ernment, he will be giving me a valu-  
able piece of information."

Mr. Fielding continued that farmers  
must look over the ground and make  
up their minds which of the two great  
parties came the nearest to their  
views.  
"For the greater part of their pro-  
gram," Mr. Fielding added, "for its  
general trend toward lower taxation,  
towards freedom of trade and reci-  
procity for everything that Liberalism  
has stood for in the past, I want to  
stand in the future and to help my  
former friends to get it."

Mr. Fielding said that he had not  
noticed a movement to appoint a perma-  
nent tariff commission, and he wished  
to discourage such a tendency.  
The reason for appointing such a  
commission was that the finance min-  
ister had not time to deal with this im-  
portant matter. The tariff, said Mr.  
Fielding, should be under the control  
of the finance minister, and he should  
surround himself with all the neces-  
sary expert advice, but the responsi-  
bility must be his.

Party Politics.  
So much had been said about the  
evils of party politics, said Mr. Field-  
ing, that he proposed to say a little  
about the good of party politics. The  
party system, he said, was in his  
opinion the best excepting under ab-  
normal conditions. During the war  
period, such conditions had prevailed.

To Support Ministry.  
Mr. Fielding said he felt he should  
continue to support the Government,  
because he thought the time had not  
come for a change. At present no  
vote, which he would give would have  
for its object the turning out of the  
Government. He did not think an  
election in the near future would be a  
good thing for the country. The con-  
test would be bitter and all kinds of  
animosity which had risen at the  
time of the last election would enter  
as factors in a new one. He did not  
think that it would be wise for the  
Liberals to get into power at present.  
The Liberal party, he said, lacked that  
unity and unanimity which was ne-  
cessary to a successful Government.  
Although he felt that the only Gov-  
ernment which would meet with real  
success was a Liberal Government,  
unity in the party must be secure.

This unity said Mr. Fielding, would  
not be obtained by differing elements  
in the party assuming "a holier than  
thou" attitude, or by throwing rocks  
at those who disagreed with them,  
neither could it be obtained by offer-  
ing Christian forgiveness to wanderers  
who strayed across the House.

On the question of prohibition, Mr.  
Fielding did not think there was need  
for a Dominion referendum. Plebi-  
scites should be left to the provinces,  
and if the provinces desired to con-  
tinue prohibition then the Dominion  
should enact such legislation as would  
make the action of the province effec-  
tive.

## Fielding Makes Kick But Supports Union

His Opinion of the Tariff  
OFFERS SOME CRITICISM BUT  
DECLARE AGAINST TURN-  
ING OUT MINISTRY  
OTTAWA, March 14.—Hon. W. S.  
Fielding, minister of finance in the  
Laurier Government, announced his  
intention of supporting the Govern-  
ment.

Left for Conscience Sake.  
He objected to the "holier than  
thou" attitude of the Opposition. The  
Opposition leader had invited them  
back into the fold, telling them "to  
come, but sin no more." These wan-  
derers were not asking for forgiveness.  
They had left the party for conscience  
sake and they did not regard them-  
selves as sinners. Mr. Fielding's  
speech was a series of contradictions.  
For instance, before 6 o'clock he made  
an eloquent plea for party Govern-  
ment and he followed this up after the  
adjournment with a magnificent ex-  
ample of independence.

There will be few Canadians who  
will agree with his attack on Sir  
Robert Borden for his attendance at  
the peace conference. He saw no rea-  
son why Canada should be represent-  
ed, and sneered at the fact that she  
was only there as a second nation. It  
was a sop to Canada. Canada was  
only given representation to satisfy  
the ambitions of Canadian politicians.  
He claimed that every State in the  
American Union had the same right  
as Canada to a position at the peace  
conference. The status granted didn't  
mean anything.

Wants No Say.  
Mr. Fielding claimed that Lloyd  
George and the British Government  
should have represented Canada. He  
objected to any change in Canada's  
present status within the empire and  
so feared any constitutional changes.  
He wanted no say in the making of  
peace and war.

Mr. Fielding at length defended the  
Liberal tariff policy, and claimed the  
West should remember it was the  
Liberals who offered reciprocity. He  
He attacked the War-Times Election  
Act, and claimed it was a disgrace to  
disfranchise alien enemies who had  
been naturalized.

The Tariff.  
Manufacturers were feeling surprised  
and alarmed in regard to the tariff.  
Mr. Fielding went on. And with the  
legislatures of Manitoba and Saskat-  
chewan unanimously passing resolu-  
tions in favor of tariff reform, with  
Government supporters in the House  
favoring tariff reduction, the manufac-  
turers had no doubt cause for alarm.  
But there had been no lack of warn-  
ing of the rising tide. He was not  
questioning the motives of the affairs  
in their attitude. But he questioned  
their wisdom. There was an intelli-  
gent selfishness and there was a  
clumsy selfishness, and "I think our  
manufacturing friends indulged in a  
clumsy selfishness when they arranged  
themselves against the reciprocity  
agreement." (Opposition cheers).

There was evidence of a deep feel-  
ing of unrest and dissatisfaction.  
There was evidence of a determination  
to get rid of the tariff.

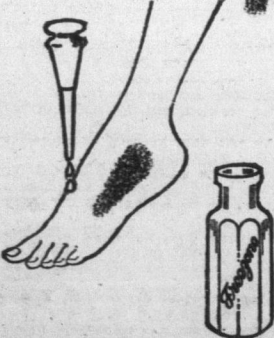

## Indebtedness of Bay City Unimportant

As Regards New Baseball League  
and National Commission.

BAY CITY, March 14.—The newly-  
organized Michigan-Ontario Baseball  
League, in which Bay City expects to  
figure, encountered its first snag to-  
day, when notice was served upon  
President Joe S. Jackson at Detroit,  
that Saginaw and Bay City will not  
be permitted by the National Commis-  
sion to be represented in the league  
until debts amounting to about \$1,000,  
said to be due players attached to the  
two clubs in 1915, when the old South-  
ern Michigan League was in existence,  
have been paid. The players concern-  
ed are said to have made claims for  
back pay totalling this amount.

Circuit Judge Houghton, who, in  
1915, was president of the Bay City  
club, has sent President Jackson a  
copy of the club's financial report for  
all of 1915, showing that all players  
were paid in full up to the end of the  
first half of the split season. After  
that time the players assumed the op-  
eration of the club themselves, the  
directors assuming no further respon-

DETROIT, March 14.—President  
Jackson, of the Michigan-Ontario Base-  
ball League, in a statement tonight  
relative to a dispatch sent out from

regarding Bay City may not be so  
serious as seems to be apprehended."
