Toronto's traffic toll, although grim, could be a lot worse, says the Ontario Safety League. For instance, London, England, had 883 road deaths in 1965. This works out at 108 deaths per million of population, compared with 64 per million in Toronto — although the proportion of vehicles to population is far higher in Toronto.

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
