Ice time 'equitable' for MHL players

The Mississauga Hockey League (MHL) has decided that every one of its 5,000 players is entitled to equal ice time.

The league passed an amendment to its constitution at its annual meeting last week which states that every player in the Mississauga Hockey League is entitled to equitable ice time.

The meeting was attended by 40 people. "What we're trying to do here is create a favorable environment for hockey in Mississauga," said outgoing MHL president George Wallace. "The key word here is 'equitable.' If a player has been suspended or is a discipline problem, he's not necessarily entitled to equal ice time.

"Basically, we're backing up the associations if they want to tell their coaches to use all of their players."

The amendment covers all of the MHL's leagues, including AAA.

Outgoing MHL secretary Bob Nichol, who chaired the meeting, said the amendment was made to place a greater emphasis on the league's objectives. "We're aiming to have every player playing equally," Nichol said. "This is designed to fulfill the objectives of the MHL."

The league also passed an amendment designed to upgrade the calibre of play.

Under the new ruling, no area association can initially ice any more hockey teams in a division than the total number of teams it has in higher divisions. For example, if an organization has one AAA team, one red team and two white teams it can have no more than four blue teams.

Marsden Kirk was elected president with Bob Heise vice-president. Bill Lawless is the new secretary and Ed Armstrong treasurer.

New directors are Chuck Roe, Grant Padgham, John Eno, John Thomas, Bob Jones and Paul McAlpine.

Mississauga recreation and parks liaison Bob Williams thanked outgoing president George Wallace for the work he has done over the last year.

Mississauga's Wendy Barber finished third in solo and fourth in figures competition at last weekend's Ontario Junior Synchronized Swimming Championships in London.

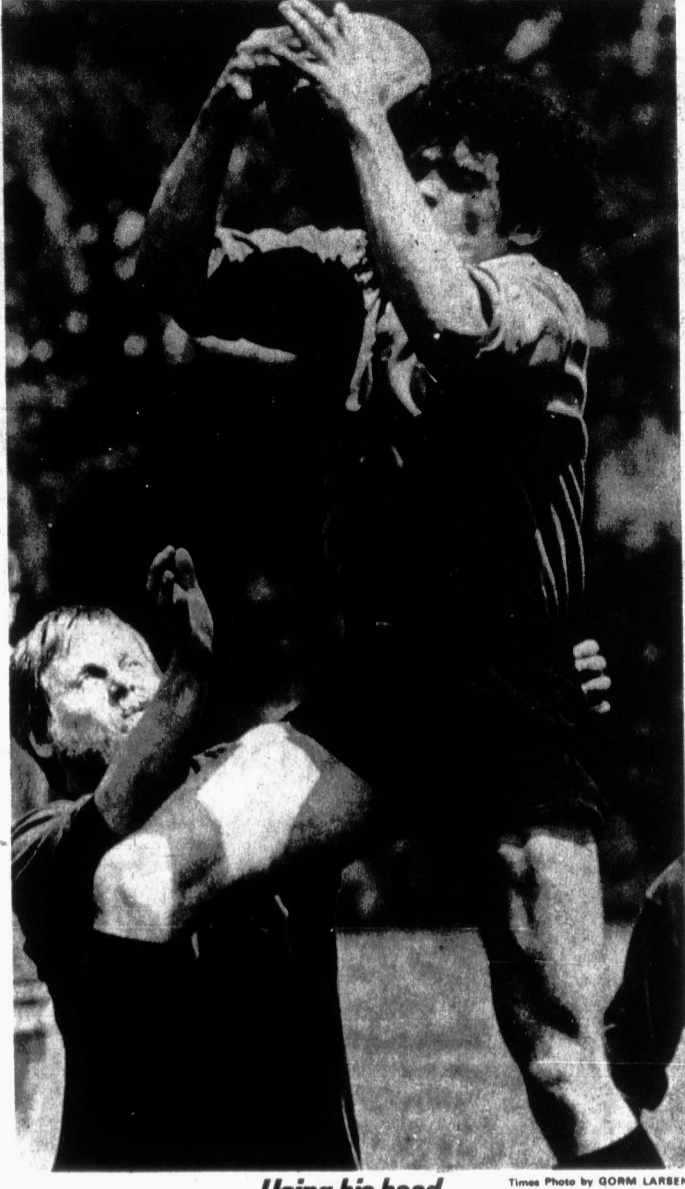
