ahead at Malton Airport it was learned last week.

"The Department of Transport, pending Treasury Board approval, has decided to extend Runway 051 to accommodate the increasing air traffic at Toronto Inter-national Airport," A. A. Speer, DOT's regional real estate manager has told town council.

Mr. Speer says the proposed extension of the runway the northernmost east-west runway at Malton can be accommodated within the existing airport boundaries.

The expansion means the closure of the 4th line road allowance north from Brittania rd. to Derrd. east where aptach lights will be inproach lights will be installed.

The allowance runs through lots 6, 7, 8, 9 and part of lot ten between concessions four and five on the west side of the

airport

General committee of council decided last week to defer consideration of the road allowance closure request until after Friday's meeting with Transport Minister Paul Hellyer in Ottawa.

AGREE? Meanwhile town engineer William Anderson recommended to committee that the proposal be agreed to on the basis that adjoining property owners give it their

approval and that DOT either acquire land in lot 8 east of the Etobicoke Creek or provides landowners with a "satis-factory" means of crossing the creek from their front lands to rear lands on their own property.

Mr. Anderson suggested council okay the request on that basis and convey the road allowance to abutting owners for a moninal sum.

Reeve Chic Murray told committee he was "most

disappointed". with, the department's announcement that it intends to go ahead with the extension of runway 05 left.

"So they are going ahead with the east-west construction of the run-way at the airport," commented Malton area councillor Frank Mc-Kechnie

He said he was still unsure just how that expansion would affect ratepayers and homeowners in ward and earlier

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asked for more information regarding potential effects

"We want to be con-cerned about this," added Ward 3 councillor Caye Killaby.

In a report to general committee, Mr. Anderson said the engineering de-partment had inspected the location involved and, as reported to council in 1963, DOT had placed approach lighting poles on the road allow ance immediately north of Etobicoke Creek

He recommended that n o improvements made on the 4th Line east until further official de-velopment of the area has been resolved.

Meanwhile three area property owners — B. E. Ambler, W. D. Courtney and W. J. Kelly, whose properties front on the 4th Line concession have asked council in a letter sent to town clerk Gordon Lumm's to take steps to have the four lighting poles removed

RIGHTS

The trio claim the poles interfere with their right of "ingress and egress.

In their letter they say: "we require the use of the 4th Line from Derry rd. this winter for the proper and full use and enjoyment of our proper-

"We intend to effect necessary improvements on part of the road allowance at our own expense this month before the

ground freezes. The letter, written in November, continues: "time is very short until the freeze-up and therefore, your prompt attention to this matter is re-

quested." The landowners also want to know when the poles will be removed so they can plan and make use of earth-moving

equipment. Mr. Anderson's report, however, says the department has provided a satisfactory detour of the roadway around the location of the lighting poles.
