WAS THROWN TO HIS DEATH

Fatal Accident Befel John McKeegan on Head St. Saturday Night.

Team Took Fright and Driver was Dashed to the Ground, Breaking his Neck.

One of the saddest accidents which have occurred in the city for some time, happened Saturday afternoon about half past five o'clock, of which John McKeegan, a well-known resident of Chatham township, was the victim.

Mr. McKeegan was building a barn on his farm and in company with his sons came to Chatham on Saturday for some shingles and lumber. He started for home with a load of shingles about five o'clock Saturday afternoon. While driving past the Wagon Works, on Head street, his horses became frightened at a shunting freight train and ran away. Mr. McKeegan, who had been drinking somewhat during the afternoon, was alone on the load and was unable to manage the horses. He was thrown out in the ditch, alighting on his head and breaking his neck. The horses were driving a big grey team, who while somewhat skittish, were never known to run away before.

Mr. McKeegan was found dead at the side of the road, where he had been thrown, and his sons, who were loading lumber on Barthe street, were sent for. The body was removed to Jahnke's morgue.

Coroner Bray was called and decided to hold an inquest. The following jury was empaneled: W. E. Hamilton, Foreman; J. D. McNabb, Gordon Bales, R. Stevens, P. McNaughton, F. Traxler, H. M. McGarvin, J. Richardson, J. McRener, T. O'Rourke, A. Richardson, H. Anderson, J. Fennell. They met at half past seven Saturday night at Jahnke's morgue and, after hearing the evidence of the sons of the deceased, adjourned until this evening at half past seven.

Hugh McKeegan, son of deceased, testified that his father was 69 years of age, and resided near Kent Bridge. The last time he saw his father alive was at five o'clock at the Idlewild hotel. Deceased was drinking at the time, but did not seem to be intoxicated. Those who were with him were Erin Coltart, J. Gladstone, Hugh and Patrick McKeegan. The team, loaded with shingles, was standing in front of the hotel. He was in the habit of drinking. He was driving a wild team. The next time he saw his father was when he was called from Barthe street. Deceased was lying at the side of the road near the Wagon Works, dead. The horses and wagon were not there, but had proceeded on their way home. Deceased gave him \$12 between 2 and 3 o'clock. It was a large load of lumber extending three tiers above the wagon box. The load was not bound on.

Pat McKeegan, also a son of deceased, corroborated everything said by his brother. He was at the hotel when his father started for home. Deceased seemed to be sober enough to drive the horses. He was setting on the front of the load, with his feet hanging down. He had often driven the horses when he was more intoxicated than he was on Saturday.

At this point the inquest adjourned.

A FULL BROTHER TO CRESCUS.

Located at Deadwood, S. D., is Foxy Quiller, the full brother of the world's champion trotter, Crescius, 2:02 1-4, says "Spirit of the West." Foxy Quiller is the property of Hanford S. Brown, who purchased the stallion in one of the Splan & Newglass Chicago sales. He is a 16-hand bay stallion of great substance and promising action. He was bred to a short time in his two-year-old form, but being large and growthy, his development was postponed until he had attained his maturity. Col. F. J. Berry, on a recent trip to Deadwood, he could speed a wagon over a common country road in 2:30. Mr. Brown intends to ship the stallion to Denver, where he will be worked for speed development. Foxy Quiller was sired by Robert McGregor, 2:17 1-2, and out of Mabel (dam of Crescius, 2:02 1-4, and Nightingale, 2:10 1-2) by Major Howard, 3:00, second dam Conception by Albie West, 2:25. A peculiarity of his breeding is the doubling of the crosses to Alexander's Abdullah, Robert McGregor being a son of Major Edsall, 2:29, by Abdullah, 2:42, and Albie West being a son of Almont, 2:39 3-4, by Abdullah, 2:42, the sire of Goldsmith Maid, 2:14, one of the ex-queens of the trotting turf.

Darrell now worked harder and in a hot scrimmage near the Chatham goal pushed the ball between the flags.

This encouraged the visitors and during the last half they put up an excellent and gentlemanly game. Anderson, for Chatham, scored again on a pass from Mowbray, making it 3 to 1 in favor of the home team.

This ended the scoring, but the battle raged for some time longer.
