

IMPORTANT FIRES IN CANADA DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE

Many Deaths in Early Part of Month due to Fire, But Improvement at End. Serious Fires in Ontario. Several Fires in Montreal due to Incendiaries

MONTREAL FIRES LESS IN NUMBER

There Were 245 Calls on the City Department in Month of May Against 305 During the Present Month—Chief Tremblay Goes Away on a Week's Holiday.

QUEBEC

Three Rivers, June 1.—Grocery and wine store of Mr. L. Ouellet, two children burned to death. Building badly damaged; fire caused by explosion of oil stove.

Montreal, June 1.—Carriage and wagon storage house belonging to Joseph Maréchal, 152 Dupresne street, destroyed by fire, partly covered by insurance of \$5,000.

Montreal, June 4.—Fire broke out in elevator casing in premises of John Robertson, 68 McGill street, causing damage to the extent of \$3,000.

Montreal, June 4.—Billard Hall, 41 Craig East, \$5,000.

Grand Mere, June 5.—Four dwellings destroyed by fire, \$25,000.

Montreal, June 5.—Rooming house, 55 St. Louis street, \$1,000.

Montreal, June 7.—Fire broke out in shed in the rear of the residence of J. M. Forrier, 424 Sherbrooke St. E. The fire did considerable damage to the rear of the houses on Sherbrooke St. The sheds were completely destroyed. Spontaneous combustion caused the fire.

Montreal, June 7.—The ice cream parlor of Eleanore Daoust, at 478 St. Catherine street east, was gutted by a fire at 11:50 last night, that was only extinguished by five streams of water, and the attendance of a brigade under three district chiefs. The fire threatened at all times to spread to the surrounding business houses. A picture hanging next door was in the greatest danger of being destroyed, and several teams were constantly kept playing in it.

Montreal, June 7.—Damage by fire amounting to \$3,000, was done when the New World moving picture theatre, 19 Archibald street, Cote St. Paul, was destroyed.

Montreal, June 8.—Dwelling, 102 St. Maurice street, destroyed by fire. Damage done yesterday afternoon by a fire which was discovered at 4:25 in the Company of the Church and Worth.

Montreal, June 15.—Fire destroyed house at 53 Marquette street and in the plant of Amigo Peruzzi, 102 St. Maurice street. The house, in which 150 gallons of oil were stored, two horses were burned to death.

Montreal, June 9.—St. Helene church, 102 St. Maurice street, narrowly escaped destruction, but the roof and part of wooden sheds in the rear of the edifice, communicated itself to the works in the rear of the church, and worked into the roof.

Montreal, June 10.—Damage was done to the extent of \$5,000 in a fire which destroyed the premises of Maurice Desjardins, cotton and wool merchant, at 102 Nazareth street.

Montreal, June 10.—Twenty thousand dollars' damage was done in a fire which occurred in the cash and door factory of J. Desjardins and Cantin in Cartierville avenue, the building, which was a two-story frame structure, was completely destroyed. The loss is covered by about five thousand dollars.

Montreal, June 11.—A most serious fire took place when the saw mill and ash and door factory and lumber shed of Paul Beaudry, 637 Davidson street, was destroyed by flames, and damage estimated at \$60,000.

Montreal, June 13.—Warehouse, S. H. Swine & Sons, 100 King street, Incendiary fire started.

Montreal, June 15.—Dressmaking establishment, Mrs. Turmel, 232 St. Catherine East, \$150.

Montreal, June 17.—Tailor shop, Bank of Montreal, 965 Notre Dame St., destroyed by fire.

Montreal, June 17.—Fire which started in the hay and grain establishment of Alphonse Labine, at the corner of La Salle and Notre Dame St., destroyed the building, which was not seriously damaged.

Quebec, June 17.—The store and private residence, with dependencies, of J. Desjardins, 880, Beauce, were destroyed by fire, the loss amounting to \$6,000, and the insurance of \$4,000.

Montreal, June 17.—Grain store, 100 La Salle Ave., Maisonneuve, destroyed by fire.

Montreal, June 18.—Fourteen residences, insurance about \$8,000, lost in E. Fortin, E. Bray, A. Nantel, T. Hall, N. Plouffe, St. Jean Baptiste, M. Plouffe, B. Aubin, Stables of Mrs. Demers, Lafortune and Tessier and Mrs. Duval, \$22,000.

Montreal, June 18.—Fire which broke out in the warehouse of Messrs. Corneille and Joly, charcoal merchants, on Iberville street, did damage to the extent of several thousand dollars.

Montreal, June 20.—Dwelling, W. A. Austin, 25 Verdun Ave., \$500, and 100 Hochelais, 260 Riel Avenue, \$300.

Montreal, June 22.—Fire destroyed the wooden one story house at 151 La Salle street, La Chine. The house, occupied by William Baker, and owned by Mr. Saxe, a tailor, was deserted at the time the fire broke out. The damage is estimated at about \$1,000, the greater part of which is said to be covered by insurance.
