The Attorney-General moved, that it is the Sense of this Committee, that the Sunk Duty Law shall not be re-enacted after the 31st December 1786, which being seconded, was put, and the Committee dividing thereon, there appeared for the Motion Tweive, against it Fisteen.

The Solicitor General moved as the Sense of the Committee, that the Excise and Impost Acts, the Turnpike and Licence Duty Acts, and the other Revenue Acts now in Force, should be continued to the first January, 1787, with such Amendments as may be found necessary, which was agreed to.

The Solicitor General also moved, That it is the Sense of the Committee, that a Duty of two and a half per cent. should be laid on all Goods imported by Non-resident Merchants, for the Support of transient
