THOUSANDS AT STATION BADE FAREWELL TO THE THIRTY-FOURTH BATTERY

Gallant Young Men Addressed by Mayor Wills and Colonel Ponton-Departure From Depot-Parting Scenes.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

It was a fine body of young men who left yesterday afternoon with the 34th Battery Royal Canadian Field Artillery for Valcartier camp. A whole train was required to transport the unit to the mobilization in Quebec county, prior to the departure for overseas service.

Thousands gathered in the vicinity of the armories at 2.30 to witness the departure of the largest body of volunteers for the front. The walks on both sides of Bridge and Pinnacle streets were lined, hundreds were on the armories grounds, every window in Hotel Quinte, the post office and the Bridge street places of business were filled with spectators.

The battery then lined up and proceeded, led by St. Michael's bugle and the Fifteenth Regiment band via Bridge, Front, Dundas and Church streets to the depot. Round after round of applause heralded their approach, and marked their passing by the crowd followed and at the depot it is estimated that nearly five thousand people met, crowding over the tracks and train.

NO INCREASE IN TOBACCO PRICES

Manufacturers have put into effect the increases in the wholesale prices in excise duties owing to the war.

These increases, it is announced, are not sufficient to warrant any increase in the retail prices, and the consumer will continue to pay the same prices as hitherto, with possibly one small exception.

The manufacturers are bearing the largest share of the increased excise, the advance in prices to the trade being slight. The price of cut tobacco and cigarettes will remain the same to the consumer, except that there is a possibility that in some cases the size of the packages of cut tobacco will be slightly reduced - perhaps from ten to nine pounds, the ordinary size now, to an equivalent of a pound.

The manufacturers have filled all orders up to the end of last week at the old prices; the slight advances going into effect this week.

HARD WORK AT VALCARTIER

Men Enjoying It - Marksmanship Demanded in Test-Singing Hymns Round Camp Fire - Many Students in Engineers.

Valcartier, Que., Aug. 27.- There are about 22,000 troops on the camping ground tonight. About 2,500 husky western lads put in an appearance today and marched down the center of the camp, cheered by thousands of throats.

WORKING HARDER

Work is becoming harder and discipline more severe. With the arrival of more troops battalions are becoming better organized and running with greater smoothness. The officers are in close touch with the men and are strict. If a man should break any regulation, such as to wrangle with a non-commissioned officer, he will be sent home. Every man must be a soldier, whether he is accustomed to it or not.

The Queen's Own, Grenadiers, Body Guards and many regiments which came from points near Toronto, along with many thousands more, are becoming hardened to the grind. In the blazing sun all day, marching many miles, skinning over hilly country and undergoing stiff musketry drills, have given them just a taste of what a soldier has to do in actual warfare, and they enjoy it.

SWIMMING PARADE

In the afternoon over 6,000 men were taken out on a march, which is entirely new. It is known as a swimming parade and has been established as a daily feature of the camp. The men were taken along any roads for about two miles to the edge of the Jacques Cartier river and there they stripped and jumped into the icy water. Those who could not swim stayed close to the shore, and those who could swim crossed the river about 50 yards wide.

STUDENTS GALORE

A very prominent section of the militia are engineers and motorcyclists. The latter stand all come from Toronto. They are 16 in number, and when their machines, which have been specially constructed for warfare, arrive they will be used principally as dispatch carriers. There are many students attached to the Engineers, who hail from all parts of Canada. During a company drill, Captain T. C. Irving of Toronto, who is in command, ordered all those who were science students or graduates to step out of the ranks. To his great surprise there were forty Toronto, Queen's and McGill men.

The Y.M.C.A. is doing splendid work in the camp. Besides erecting a writing and reading marquee and canteen, religious services are conducted every night by James Fergie. Many thousands gathered around a huge bonfire at an outdoor campfire meeting tonight and listened to an inspiring address and sang several hymns such as "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Onward Christian Soldiers." Those who could not attend could hear the singing for miles around.

ANGLICANS STRONG

About 60 per cent. of the entire camp are members of the Anglican church. There are also 20 Anglican chaplains here. Every morning just before the boys go on parade the chaplains intend to conduct prayer in the infantry and cavalry lines. This plan was inaugurated by Chaplain Piper, of the Niagara district. It is not compulsory, but practically every man attends.

TO MAKE 50,000 PAIRS

Socks To Be Manufactured For the Soldiers

The Kingston Hosiery Co. has received an order from the militia department for 50,000 pairs of heavy gray socks. These are for winter use, and will keep the mill going at capacity for a month. The hosiery department at the mill has been working steadily all winter. The socks will be sent to Valcartier and there supplied to the soldiers.

Fakers at Fall Fares

To Be Rounded Up
