

WHEN PEELING ONIONS.

The pungent odor of onions is du to a sulphurous oil, which wolatizes rapidly when the tissues of the vege-table is broken in any manner, and especially affects the delicate mem-branes surrounding the eyes. This effect, however, can be easily avoided by sticking a small pared potato on the end of the knife with which the the end of the knife with which the cutting is done. A chemical affinity which cannot be readily explained, but which which is none the less satisfactory in its working, attracts the fumes, and their presence is not manifested to the operator till the potato has reached a certain degree of saturation, when it can be readily replaced by another.
