TRADE WITH SOUTH AFRICA.

The Dominion Government has done a good stroke of business in concluding an arrangement for a steamship service between Canada and South Africa. During the next half dozen years, if peace is maintained, the progress in all South Africa will be enormous.

There is no good reason why Canada should not get a goodly share of the trade which will result from this progress. The African veldt is much similar to our own northwest country and the agricultural machinery made by Canadian firms ought, with little change, to suit conditions there. In these articles there will be a very large trade. As the Boer farmer prospers all he needs in the way of furniture, manufactured and building lumber, and other articles in common use by farmers might easily be turned out in Canada to greater advantage than any other country, except, perhaps, the United States.

Canada's trade with South Africa in the future will depend entirely upon her enterprise, for that country must needs always be a great importer of goods Canada manufactures.

PROFITABLE STUDY.

There are a good many farmers in this province who would enjoy life more than they do if they studied pigs with the same assiduity that they study politics, comments the St. Thomas Journal.

There is money for the farmer in knowing all about hogs. There is only trouble with the neighbors in knowing all about politicians.

How to fatten hogs is knowledge of greater value than how to elect M. P's.

There is not so much excitement in it, perhaps; but then there is not so much likelihood of a mortgage settling down on a man's property if he pursues the peaceful occupation of raising pork, and leaves politics (as a pursuit) to lawyers.

WHAT HE SAYS GOES.

In a speech made at Midland, yesterday, Hon. Israel Tarte intimated that the building of ships should be bonused, and said that protection to our industries was a necessity, and we must follow the lead of the Americans with a tariff framed for Canadian purposes. That is very good talk, and entirely different from the shilly-shallying speeches made by the alleged premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier. And what Mr. Tarte says is important, for the reason that he is the leading spirit of the cabinet. What he says goes. It is now up to the Hamilton Times to throw a lot of bad language at that fine old Tory protectionist, Tarte.

Snails.

The popularity of the snail as an article of food is not confined to Paris, but extends throughout southern Europe and some parts of Africa. Dr. Edrard, a French writer, in a pamphlet says that 90,000 pounds of snails are sent daily to Paris from the gardens of Polton, Burgundy, Champagne and Provence. Those reared in gardens are fed on aromatic herbs to improve their flavor. Their market price is from 2 francs 50 centimes to 3 francs 50 centimes a hundred, while those from the hedges, woods and forests bring only 2 francs to 2 francs 50 centimes. The proprietor of one snailery in the vicinity of Dijon nets over 7,000 francs annually.

The snail is reared and fattened with great care in some cantons of Switzerland as an article of luxury and is exported in a pickled state. It is also eaten as a relish and nutritious article of food in Austria, Spain, Italy and in some sections of the United States. The Ashantes and other African tribes smoke them and eat them as daily food all the year around. In Algeria in the markets large heaps of snails are sold by the bushel and the hundred as an article of food. Vendors hawk them in the streets of Cairo. In modern Rome fresh gathered snails are hawked by women from door to door.

Some have such bad luck that life seems one grand confidence game to them.

Township Councils

CAMDEN COUNCIL.

Council met on Monday, Aug. 4th, 1902; all members present.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

A number of accounts were ordered to be paid.

A number of communications were read.

By-law on Greenwood drain was read a first and second time and provisionally adopted, and the clerk instructed to serve the required copies.

A by-law for the repair of bridges over the Little Bear Creek, in the Township of Dover, and served upon the Reeve of Camden, of the Township of Dover, was read and adopted, and the Clerk instructed to prepare a by-law to raise the sum of \$25.40, the amount chargeable to Camden lands.

J. Wannamaker and L. Lindsay appeared before the Council, complaining of water flowing from road over their lands. Left with Reeve and Com'r Brown to investigate.

Councillors Hazlett and Blackburn, of the town of Dresden, appeared before the Council with reference to the repair of a culvert in the corporation of Dresden, opposite Bradley farm. The Reeve and Com'r Brown were appointed a committee to meet a committee from Dresden to consider the matter.

Notice from John Parking to repair the Lampman-Parking drain was read. —Entertained.

Petition from John McCutcheon and five others, asking that a portion of the George drain be abandoned and that a new drain be constructed, was read and entertained.

The Council, after considering the question of statute labor, have decided to abolish the old system and repair the roads and bridges out of the general fund, under the supervision of the commissioners of the different divisions, or of others appointed by the Council by the Council. The Clerk was instructed to prepare a by-law for the purpose of abolishing statute labor.

Wm. Van Allen made complaint of water running off the River road in the 3rd concession onto his land. Left with Com'r of division to investigate. Council adjourned.

LOVER COUNCIL.

The council met pursuant to adjournment at the Town Hall, Aug. 4th. The members were all present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. Two resolutions of Tilbury East council were read, one offering a grant of \$25.00 for the establishment of a passenger ferry at St. Peter's church on the River Thames on the following conditions, namely, 1st, that a suitable ferry shall first be established at or near said church to the satisfaction of the council; 2nd, that the Township of Dover also make an equal grant for the same purpose; 3rd, that it shall be a free ferry on Sundays. The other, where the County Council has made an offer of a grant of \$50.00 for the establishment of a suitable ferry at Chalmers farm, lots 5 and 6, on the River Thames. Be it resolved that this council also make a grant of \$50.00 for the same purpose on condition that the Township of Dover make a similar grant of \$50.00.

Alfred Pinsonneault petitioned the council to grant him the commutation of his statute labor from one Beat to another Beat. W. G. McGeorge's report on the Terry drain was read and considered as per notice to the owners assessed. A resolution was read, signed by W. J. Badger and eleven other ratepayers of Dover's part of U. S. No. 15, Chatham and Dover Townships, asking that said U. S. be dissolved, and that the Dover part of the Union Section be added to the nearest school section thereto in Dover. A notice was read from the County Clerk stating that the amount of county rate levied on the Township of Dover for the current year is \$3,400.21, and that the amount due the county from Dover for the same purpose is \$1,400.21. Moved by Trudell and Grant, that whereas Tilbury East council has passed a resolution offering a grant of \$25.00 for the establishment of a passenger ferry at St. Peter's church on the River Thames, on condition that the Township of Dover also make an equal grant for the same purpose, and that it be a free ferry on Sundays; resolved that a grant of \$25.00 be made by the council of Dover Township, as proposed by the council of Tilbury East. —Carried.

Moved by Grant and Crawford, that the following accounts be paid paid for work on the 5th concession Mechanical drain, as per order of L. Sterling, commissioner, McKenough & Trotter \$157, James Sterling \$4.75, John Raymond \$6.00, Louis Sterling \$5.00 for machine oil and extra work. —Carried.

Moved by Wright and Trudell, that the agreement made with R. J. Dunlop and John Bowes as to the time to have their part of the McFarlane drain embankment removed, be renewed for one year from April 30th, 1902. —Carried.

Moved by Trudell and Wright, that the Banner-News account, to be paid for advertising Court of Revision. —Carried.

Moved by Wright and Trudell, that W. Drader's account, \$1.85, be paid for wood for Mrs. Chute and charged to charity. —Carried.

Moved by Wright and Crawford, that George Gautier's case be referred to the Reeve to investigate with power, and if he sees fit to get him a ticket to take him to his people. —Carried.

Moved by Wright and Grant, that the small-pox accounts not settled for be referred to the Reeve and clerk to be placed in the solicitor's hands for collection forthwith. —Carried.

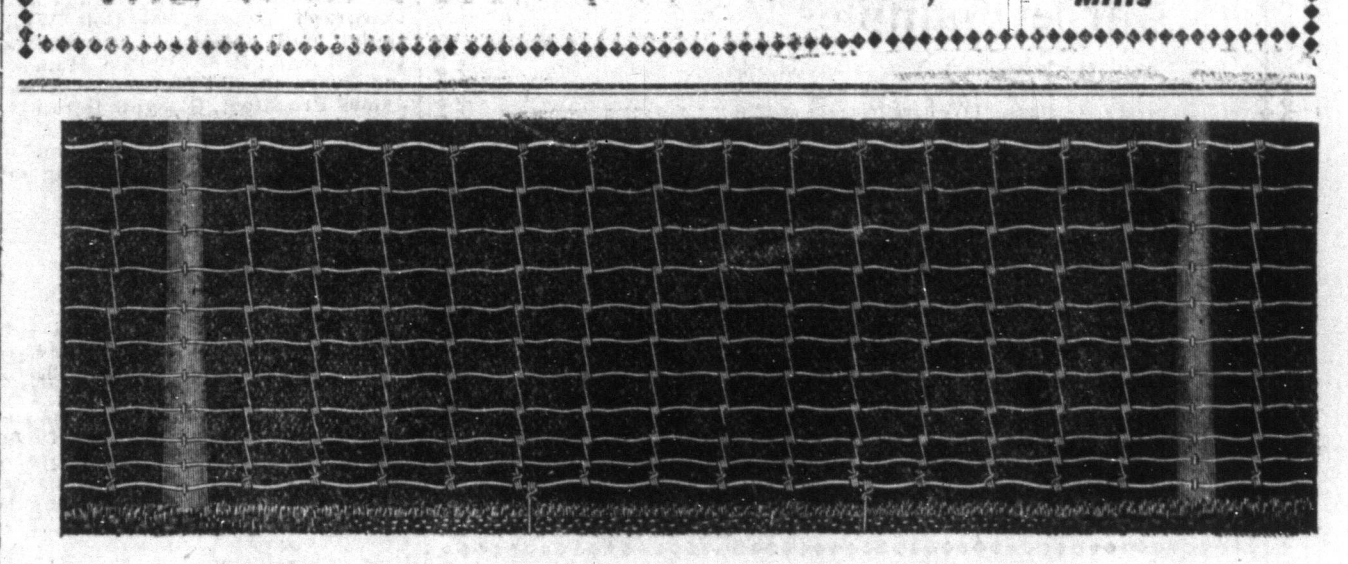
