REUNION SERVICES

Latter Day Saints Are Holding Series Of Special Meetings Here

The Latter Day Saints are holding a series of services in their chapel in North Chatham this week. There is a good attendance of Saints from all parts of the mission.

At 10.30, June 9, the Saints were called to order by President Arthur Leveton, of Clearville. After singing and prayer, by resolution, President Evans of London, was chosen to preside during the reunion sessions. Elders A. L. Evans, of Green and Shoblin were chosen his associates. A. R. He has, however, been in bad company of late, and his evil associations have got him into this trouble. He was allowed to go and will come up on Saturday.

William Riby, Jr., was charged in the police court this morning with assaulting a man named Kennedy. The stories told by the complainant and the defendant were quite different, and the judge adjourned the case for a week to get at the bottom of the matter.

The police have received a complaint from several canoeists in the city who have been bothered lately by some small boys who have the habit of standing on the Pere Marquette bridge over the river, and pelting stones down at passing canoeists. Last night one mad had a very narrow escape from serious injury. He was passing under the bridge in a canoe when a boy hit him in the ear with a stone.
