

Ontario Fruit Shipped To The North West Does not compare with that From British Columbia

Ontario apple shippers will have to change their mechods if they want to capture the Northiwest market, is the conclusion of Mr. W. S. Summer-feldt, Jackson's Point, who has just returned from the West, whence he has been shipping his apples this

yeart
"I saw a good many Ontario apples out there," he said, "but most of them were poorly selected. Many of them were either spotted or wormy and did not compare at all favorably in appearance with the wormy and and not compare at all la-vorably in appearance with the British Columbia apples, which are large and have a good color. The result is, that while Ontario apples, graded No. 1, sell for \$4 per barrel, the British Columbia growers get \$2 a box, which is equal to more than \$6 per barrel. In flavor, our apples, are distinctly superior to those from the coast and they should be able to hold the market, but we have to send out apples that are clearer and better believes that are clearer and

better looking.

"American apples are being shipped in large quantities, but only one variety, the American Ben Davis, and as it is of a lower grade it will not hurt Ontario shippers much."—Toronto News.
