Another Report that Japs Sank Seven Steamers at mouth of Harbor

Russians Again Demand Withdrawal of Chinese Officials and Soldiers From Manchuria.

London, Friday, March 25 .- The Daily Telegraph publishes a despatch from its Tokio correspondent, under esterday's date, which says:-"On the night of March 22 the Japanese fleet renewed the attempt to bottle up Port Arthur. Sixteen warships escorted seven merchant steamers to the mouth of the harbor, and under the mouth or the marror, and under cover of the bombardment the steam-ers were run in and sunk in desired positions. Three thousand Japanese officers and blue jackets volunteered for this duty. An official report is expected this evening."
