Wales Beat the New Zealanders.

"ALL BLACKS" WATERLOO.

The English papers of recent date contain a vivid account of the great rugby game in which New Zealand went down before the representatives of gallant little Wales and thereby sustained the only reverse of their remarkable tour.
There were several contributing causes towards the downfall of the All Blacks but possibly the singing by Welshmen of the song annexed hereto had most to do with the defeat of the visitors. The strange looking poetry is called "The Cyrrus's song of peace" and sung by 50,000 voices as only Welshmen can sing was enough to demoralize any visiting team.

Fifty thousand spectators went to the game with delight when Morgan, the speedy left winger, raced over the line and scored, and when the final whistle blew leaving the Welshmen victorious such a scene of indescribable enthusiasm was witnessed as never before had occurred on a football arena.
