WATER NOTICE.

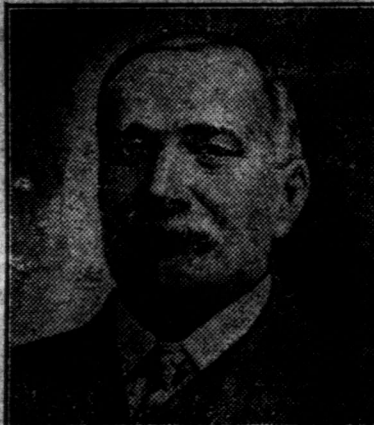
