

PRO-BOER MEETING IN U. S.

Calls Upon Roosevelt to Preserve Neutrality.

Acting President Schalk-Burg-
er Was in Captured Lager,

But Succeeded in Slipping Away In
the Darkness.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—An enthusiastic meeting of Boer sympathizers was held today at the Lafayette Square theatre and resolutions adopted calling on President Roosevelt and congress to use all their power to prevent the further exportation of horses and mules to the English in South Africa. A collection was taken up for the benefit of the Boer widows and orphans.

Commandant Krige, formerly of the Boer army, recited events in South Africa and said neither he nor any other Boer wanted to create hatred between the American and English nations, but every Boer called to America and the American people to put a stop to the shipment of horses and mules to South Africa and to maintain strict neutrality. The Boers will never be conquered, he said, while the last man stands.

LONDON, Feb. 21.—Acting President Schalk-Burg-er and other members of the Boer government were in the laager captured at Noutgedacht, Transvaal Colony, by a detachment of Mounted National Scouts under Col. Park, but succeeded in escaping capture.

Terry McGovern Knocks out Dave Sullivan in the 15th Round.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 22.—Terry McGovern defeated Dave Sullivan tonight in the arena of the Southern Athletic Club after 15 rounds of as desperate fighting as ever was seen in any ring. From the first tap of the gong until the end it was hammer and tongs nearly every second with each man working away with all the energy he had. There has seldom been seen a fight where the issue was more in doubt. In one round it would be Sullivan who was ahead and in the next McGovern. McGovern, knowing that the fight meant his position in the front ranks as a fighter, was after his opponent every second. In the majority of the rounds he was on the aggressive and Sullivan was forced to do more defensive work than his opponent. He put up a wonderful fight, however, was game to the core and lost the fight more through a blunder of his own than because he was knocked out. When the finish came, however, he was groggy and going fast.

Sullivan was badly punished, his left ear being split open, his lips cracked, his nose well pounded up and his right eye partly closed.

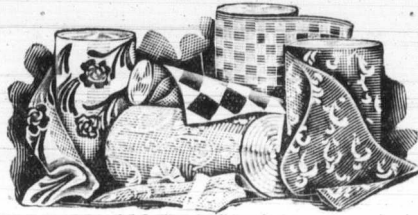
OBITUARY.

CANADA'S MILITIA.

The Famous Lord Dunsford May Succeed General O'Grady-Haly.

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—It is understood that Lord Dunsford who has been a prominent figure in connection with the South African war, holding a prominent command, will be the next major general commanding the militia, if he accepts the conditions attached to his appointment will be similar to those which were placed in the appointment of General Hutton by the Australian government. These are principally that he be under the control of the Canadian government and subordinate to the minister of militia. The Canadian government deems this necessary because of the attitude assumed by Gen. Hutton when commanding the forces in Canada.

DOMINION COAL.

Spectacular Rise in the Stock Has Brought Fortune to a Number.

MONTREAL, Feb. 23.—Senator Cox, of Toronto, and James Ross, of Montreal, are the biggest winners in the spectacular rise in the stock of the Dominion Coal Company. In a few months the shares of the company have risen \$80,000,000 and several large fortunes have been made. The directors of the company who are considerably richer than they were six months ago, are Lord Strathcona, R. B. Angus, Sir William Van Horne, Senator Forges, H. C. Whitney, Senator MacKeen, J. S. McLaughlin, B. F. Pearson, H. F. Dimock and C. Shields.

PRINCE HENRY LANDS.

New York, Feb. 23.—Prince Henry of Prussia, representative of his brother, the Emperor of Germany, at the launching of the latter's American built yacht, reached New York today and was cordially welcomed as the guest of the nation. The land batteries sounded the first greeting in a salute of 21 guns, the rifles of a special naval squadron echoed the sentiment. There were verbal greetings from the representatives of President Roosevelt, the army, the navy and the city of New York and a great crowd lined the way into the city to see and cheer the sailor Prince of Germany.
