The reports indicate that there will be a large quantity of very small apples, otherwise fairly good. Shippers should not forget that there is no lowering of the standard and that the size for No. 1 or No. 2 is not the medium size as grown in Western or Southern Ontario in 1907, but the medium size in an orin 1907, but the medium size in an or-dinary season. There will, therefore, be a large number of apples that will be marked No. 2 or even No. 3 for no other reason than that they are too small to qualify for a higher grade. The Fruit Inspectors have already recommended recomm prosecution of some shippers who have offended in this particular.

Toronto, Aug. 29.—Conductor Edward Wansbrough, of Toronto Junction, was killed in a rear-end collision which occur-red on the C. P. R. near Manvers station red on the C. P. Two sections of a freight train, mainly composed of re-frigerator ears, were travelling east, and the first section, which had stopped for water at Manvers, had just pulled away from the station when the crash came. It is said six men were in the rear-end caboose of the first train, but all escaped except Wansbrough, who was sleeping at the time. He was almost instantly killed.


