The despatch says that it appears that the situation is likely to be still further complicated by the caste hatred between the blacks and mulattoes. Ev-eryone dreads the possibility of a massa-cre of the Europeans by the Haytian troops on the arrival of the warships. troops on the arrival of the warships.

The despatch declares that it is under stood there that Germany will take action if the government executes more rebels. President Nord Alexis, however, seems quite unmoved at the prospect of a navel demonstration. The total number of men executed is not given.
