FEAR MASSACRE.

the number. He says that up to last night 27 men had been executed. He said that the French Government had not anticipated the slightest friction with the United States over the situation in the Haytian republic. The Monroe doctrine in no sense involved and there is no question of intervention. The sole purpose of France, Germany, Great Britain and presumably the United States is the protection of foreign subjects against the rapacity of the Haytian soldiery. He would the latter throw off the control of the authorities.

Fear For Massacre.

Paris, March 17.—A despatch from Port au Prince states that President Nord Alexis has consented to allow the refugees in the French legation to leave the island, but that beneficent relief taking refuge in the consulates will be removed by force, if they are not surrendered. The despatch says that it appears that the situation is likely to be still further complicated by the caste hatred between the blacks and mulattoes. Everyone dreads the possibility of a massacre of the Europeans by the Haytian troops on the arrival of the warships. The despatch declares that it is understood there that Germany will take action if the government executes more rebels. President Nord Alexis, however, seems quite unmoved at the prospect of a naval demonstration. The total number of men executed is not given.

Situation Worse.

Washington, March 17.—The Haytian situation is described by the State Department officials to-day as decidedly more grave than at any time since the revolution has been in progress there. Despatches received early in the day are to the effect that the Haytian Government has reversed its decision to allow the refugees in the foreign legations to leave the country. They will not be allowed to do so. As a further protection to American interests in the island, the cruiser Des Moines was ordered to proceed at once to Port au Prince from Guantanamo. The gunboat Eagle was despatched there yesterday. It is estimated the Des Moines can make the trip approximately in fifteen hours. The only instructions given are that American interests shall be protected.

To wind up the affair Bandmaster Stares gave a short but entertaining history of the band and a sketch of the work, and was in the act of declaring the evening's proceedings over when Band Secretary, Corp. Joe Gimblett, stepped forward and, on behalf of the band, presented Mr. Stares with a fine roller top combination desk. He referred to the bandmaster's good work during the ten years, during five of which the organization was known as the Sons of England band and five as the Ninety-First Highlanders. Congratulations were showered upon the recipient and the affair was brought to a close by singing "He's a Jolly Good Fellow," "Auld Lang Syne" and the National Anthem.

BACK FROM OTTAWA

But Mr. Sealey Remains to Watch Interests.

Messrs. D. C. Platt, President of the Swine Breeders' Association of Canada, Hon. John Dryden and Mr. Joseph Featherston, ex-M. P. P., Streetsville, returned from Ottawa last night after having had a satisfactory interview with Hon. Wm. Paterson and Hon. Sydney Fisher in relation to the duty on hogs. Mr. W. O. Sealey, the other member of the deputation appointed by the Breeders' Association, remained in Ottawa to further press the matter. The deputation pointed out that Canadian hogs are selling at 5 cents a pound, live weight, and American hogs are worth as much. Live hogs cannot be brought into Canada on account of cholera on the other side, but the bacon is brought in against a duty of 3 cents on green and 2 cents on cured. The deputation urged that an increase of two cents on both green and cured be made, or that the dumping clause be enforced, as they believed the conditions clearly showed that the United States breeders were there, dumping their large surplus supply into Canada. While the deputation was in Ottawa they went into a large store and priced pork. They were asked 20 cents by the piece and 21 cents a pound if cut. As live hogs are worth only 54 cents and dressed pork 64¢ to 7¢, they did not fail to make a point of the fact that the consumers are not getting the benefit of the present low prices.

SEE WHITNEY

Was Told That There Are 2,000 Unemployed in Toronto.

Toronto, March 17.—(Special)—Four representatives of the unemployed immigrants now in Toronto waited on Premier Whitney this morning and asked for immediate relief in the way of work. Their spokesman, H. B. Dixon, who came to Canada last summer under the auspices of the Salvation Army, said that there were 2,000 unemployed immigrants in Toronto "absolutely willing to work." He asked that the Salvation Army be prevented from bringing more people to Ontario until those already brought had obtained work. The Prime Minister replied that in the first place the Government was not going to bring out anybody except those with some capital, who it is believed could find opportunities to work in Ontario. It was not going to bring people from cities to dump them in rural districts, where they would be utterly useless. The Salvation Army was the only organization which had done its duty in taking their settlers to their destinations and if they would congregate in cities what could be done? There was plenty of room for farm laborers in the Province. "You are here; you are human beings and something should be done," said Mr. Whitney, who promised to discuss the subject with the Minister of Public Works and notify his visitors of the result. "We are told that something can be done in six weeks, but we cannot wait," remarked the spokesman of the delegation.
