## HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Sifted coal ashes, wheat flour and  
sand mixed with water make an excel-  
lent mortar for patching holes  
where plaster is broken.

If string beans are prepared for  
some hours before they are to be  
cooked, wash them, drain them and  
put them in a bowl covered with a  
wet cloth.

When frying the stove is often  
splashed over with grease. To pre-  
vent this sprinkle salt in the frying  
pan before putting in the fat.

Many a laundress finds that an excel-  
lent bleaching medium is made by  
adding a little turpentine or kero-  
sene to the water in which clothes  
are boiled.

Long stiff wire with a bit of cloth  
on the end will be found an excellent  
substitute for a brush in cleaning the  
drain pipe of the refrigerator.

When a lemon is halved or quartered  
and left unused, a tumbler over it,  
protecting it from the air will keep it  
from drying or moulding for several  
days.

When next serving lemon sherbet,  
add to the sherbet an equal quantity  
of chopped figs, dates, raisins, and  
nuts. Serve in glasses tipped with  
whipped cream.

To make croutons for soup quickly,  
cut the bread into cubes and put it in  
a corn pepper. Shake this over the

fire as if popping corn, and it will  
soon brown.

It is wise to put sand into the bot-  
tom of tall vases before slipping the  
flowers into place. The weight of  
the sand will prevent the flower  
from being top heavy.

Be sure to include borax in the  
toilet accessories when going off to  
an outing. Should the water be hard  
borax will soften it, so that the skin  
will not suffer.

Every day beat and shake the pil-  
lows. Pushing the hands in each  
pair of corners in turn, work the  
hand thoroughly through the feath-  
ers to separate them and make them  
fluffy.

If the varnished surface of a piece  
of furniture is injured by chloroform  
amphor or any other liquid which  
dissolves varnish, rub the spot a  
once with olive oil or linseed oil.

A piece of stale bread, a small  
lump of soda or a piece of charcoal  
placed in the pot will lessen the dis-  
agreeable odor that arises when cook-  
ing cauliflower or cabbage.

When cooking mush for fried mush  
do not cook as long as for eating,  
but pour into a deep pan after stir-  
ring ten minutes. When cold dip the  
slices in beaten egg and they will be  
crisp.

It is wise to wash the egg beate  
directly after it is used. If this is  
impossible, save yourself trouble  
later by plunging it at once into a  
bowl of water, so the egg cannot  
harden on it.

Keep a bottle of ammonia at hand  
to use when acid takes the color from  
any fabric. Apply a little of the  
ammonia immediately, and in almost  
every instance the color will be re-  
stored.

### God's Acre.

Mount Carmel Cemetery, on the  
north side of Quidi-Vidi Lake, has  
been much improved and beautified,  
thanks to His Grace Archbishop  
Howley, who saw the necessity of  
appointing a number of gentlemen to  
act as a Board of Directors, and one  
has only to visit the grounds to see  
the great change made in the general  
appearance of the cemetery within  
the past eight or ten years. New  
walks have been made, sanded and  
graded, fences have been added, a  
very neat Mortuary Chapel has been  
built, a large field of over five acres  
purchased, hundreds of assorted  
trees have been planted, and I am  
pleased to be informed that all of  
this property and improvements are  
paid for. This proves that those of  
our citizens interested in Mount Car-  
mel have contributed liberally from  
their limited means and are working  
harmoniously with the Board of  
Managers. During the present year  
the management had to have erected  
a substantial concrete retaining wall  
of upwards of 400 feet long, the  
money for which had to be raised by  
loan from one of the banking insti-  
tutions. They are nothing daunted

diture, for they know that they have  
the generous support of interested  
men; and now for this purpose the  
Board of Directors for the first time  
during all their years in charge earnestly  
appeal for a substantial contribu-  
tion on Sunday next, 17th inst., when  
the annual Requiem Mass will be  
celebrated and an appropriate ser-  
mon preached by Rev. Dr. Kitchin,  
P. P. St. John's Parish. It is there-  
fore hoped that a large congregation  
will be present, for apart from the  
religious ceremonies a large con-  
course will show the gentlemen in  
charge of Mount Carmel Cemetery  
that their work is being fully appre-  
ciated.—Com.
