Charlottetown, January 3.-A tragedy took place to-day at Clyde River. by which Colin MacPhail, postmaster and his sister lost their lives, and complete comin the little cotage where hev lived was burned to the ground. A neighbor, Neil MacKinnon passing, lof le discovered that the house was on fire and gave the alarm, and in a few minutes time, over one hundred peo-

ple had gathered. The body of Miss McPhail was found in a corner of the kitchen burned to a crisp, where she had falden, but the body of her brother wa removed before the flames got into the bedroom, life being extinct. however, he having been suffocated in bed. His body was passed out through the window.
