The ship is not limited to time or course, this being left to the discretion of Commander Larnder, but the orders are that no effort is to be left untried to secure hodies of victims or information regarding the disaster. Whether ship will proceed to New York the Halifax after her search is concluded is not yet known, but will be deternined by developments of the cruise and conveyed to the ship from head-quarters by wireless. The ship has been taking in a lot of cable here this week and was to have left shortly for the New York coast to do cable repair work there that was expected to take some weeks. It is expected, herefore, that if any bodies are picked up she will be ordered to land them at New York and while there will undertake her job, not returning here perhaps for a month. Should no bodies be recovered she is likely to re-Halifax before proceeding to New York.
