Our New Standard Two Battalions.

The Government has authorized the raising of two battalions of the Newfoundland Regiment with the necessary reserves. For some time we have urged on the Government the desirability of taking this step, and we glad to see that the Government is the only body that could authorize the taking of such a step, and it will be now up to the young men of the country to respond to the call. The standard set is high as regards what we have done in the other Dominions. In proportion to population that stands while has already been reached and passed in Canada, and Australia has now set before herself the task of doubling it. As compared with what has been done in New Zealand, it is small for our population. Australia with twenty times our population expects to have 300,000 men with the colors by the summer. This is about four times the standard of enlistment which our Government has authorized. It is clear then that the standard is quite moderate when compared with that of the other Dominions, and it is particularly so as compared with the 4,000,000 standard which is set up by Parliament for Great Britain. It is attempted to measure up to that standard, we should be placing before ourselves the task of raising ten times as many men as it is proposed shall be the Newfoundland land force strength. It must be apparent then that the standard is moderate, but moderate as it is, it will require great effort to attain it by the end of the present year. Roughly speaking it means getting as many men together during that time as have joined the colors since the war commenced. That will be no mean task. But it is a task which must be faced and carried out, if Newfoundland is to hold up her head and carry herself with proper pride and patriotism among our kin across the seas.

More Patriotic Events Contemplated.

Encouraged by the success that attended their efforts in the patriotic hockey matches on Thursday night last, we understand that the promoters are contemplating the holding of another event for the benefit of the W. P. A. Fund before the season draws to a close. In all probability the programme will consist of a series of races; a hockey match between a picked team of the "has-beens" and seven of the best present League players, and lastly but by no means least, a lady's concert.

Patriotic Association Meets.

His Excellency the Governor presided at last night's meeting of the Patriotic Association in the Board of Trade Building. The minutes of last meeting were read by Secretary Burke. The list of casualties up to date in the First Newfoundland Regiment was then announced and reads:

Killed in action or died of wounds 15
Died of disease 15
Wounded 290
In hospital and not yet fit for duty 392

Making a total of 517

The Governor announced that Lt. Col. Hadow is now in charge of the Regiment, and that the names of Lieut. James Donnelly who won the Military Cross, Sergt. Greene and Private Hyman who both received D. C. M.'s, Lieut.-Col. Franklin had been mentioned in despatches, and Major Macpherson was remembered and commended.

Capt. and Adj. W. Rendell is now doing duty at Ayr, and is recommended for his majority, whilst the names of Captains O'Brien, Rowsell and Bernard have been brought under His Excellency's notice.

Lieut. Frank Summers has been made Captain.

Lieut. Tait is acting as Adjutant of the Regiment on service and Second Lieut. Carter, Fox, Herder, Hunt, Baine, and Steele have been promoted to the rank of Lieutenants, dating from Oct. 15th, 1915.

Mr. W. H. Greene has been appointed to the temporary rank of Captain of the Second Battalion of our Regiment.

The Reserve Force Committee's report shows the following figures:—1,875 men have been despatched on active service. Since the formation of the Committee 1,421 names were placed on the Volunteer Roll, and the total number of enlistments are 2,776. The report expresses appreciation of the voluntary services of city and out-port medical men.

The minutes of the Executive Government read by Hon. P. T. McGrath. It showed that up to Dec. 21st last \$98,543.74 had been contributed and that \$11,776.78 had been paid to Newfoundland beneficiaries.

The Finance Committee's statement read by Hon. P. T. McGrath showed a balance on hand of \$18.83.

The Non-Combatant Committee reported that Miss Nellie Tauck, a nurse, had sailed on January 13th en route to England, the Committee providing transportation.

The minutes of the Executive Government on recruiting and the report of the Recruiting Committee elicited discussion in which the Hon. P. T. McGrath, the Prime Minister and Messrs. Kent, Chitt, Grievie, Blackall, McNab and Lloyd took part. Eventually the following resolution was adopted on motion of Mr. Grievie, seconded by Mr. Blackall:—

"That this meeting, having heard the minutes of the Executive Government, dated Feb. 4th, to the effect that it is proposed to sanction additional recruiting to whatever extent is necessary, is of opinion that the forces on active service should be increased to 2 battalions with the necessary reserves, and having heard the Premier's oral declaration that the Government is prepared to endorse a decision to that effect, is prepared to take the necessary steps to carry it into effect."

The Prime Minister stated that the Government would sanction the payments by the Finance Committee out of the Government grants, the expenses of a recruiting campaign.

On motion of Capt. O'Brien, a resolution was passed that the Patriotic Funds be increased.
