## TODAY'S MESSAGES.

AUSTRIA AT THE END.

LONDON, Jan. 11. The Austrian Government has announced to the Entente that it is at the end of its resources, and no longer in a position to continue, according to a report which was received in official German quarters, says a London Times despatch from Berlin.

SCIENTIFICALLY DESTROYED.

DUBLIN, Jan. 11. Two interesting statements came today. The first, from the British authorities, explains that those houses destroyed at Middleton and Meelin, near Cork, were not destroyed by fire, which would have endangered human property, but scientifically, explosives, where the range and area were carefully calculated. The second, from a Sinn Féin source, asserts that not the military, but the constabulary, were responsible for the institution of official reprisals.

A DOUBTFUL AGREEMENT.

LONDON, Jan. 11. Lord Krasin, Russian Bolshevik Minister of Trade and Commerce, who has been in London on a commercial mission, left this afternoon for Moscow. He carried with him modified proposals for a trade agreement between Britain and Soviet Russia. Mr. Krasin, prior to his departure, told a representative of the Daily Herald of his latest conversation with Sir Herbert Horne, President of the Board of Trade, had not brought an agreement appreciably nearer.

LAST FULL WAGES FOR SHORT TIME.

LONDON, Jan. 11. Reports from labor exchanges show addition of eighty-five thousand to ranks of the unemployed in the week, but there are no signs, despite many cabinet deliberations, that Government is any nearer a solution of the problem. The Government's original suggestion, giving an insurance benefit of fifteen shillings per week to unemployed, and placing Government establishments on short time, as a reduction of the weekly wage, declared by the Labor Party to be inadequate, and the party refuse to co-operate with the Government on any such basis, demanding even if short time is adopted, there shall be no reduction in wages.

RIOTING IN INDIA.

LAHABAD, British India, Jan. 11. The police are powerless to quell rioting in this region, which has spread to Sultanpur, sixty miles to the northeast, where buildings have been burned. Troops have been summoned from Lucknow. There have been six hundred persons arrested.

THE FORNEY TARIFF BILL.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. Hearings on the Forney Emergency Tariff Bill were concluded by the Senate.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE.

LONDON, Jan. 12. Only two or three friends greeted Mrs. Terence MacSwiney on her arrival here from New York, aboard the steamer Panhandle State, yesterday.

WHO KNOWS HIM?

HAMILTON, Ont., Jan. 12. Ludwig Harding, formerly of Newfoundland, was found guilty yesterday of robbing mails, and was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary.

NATURALLY NOT.

ATHENS, Jan. 12. King Constantine declared today that he did not believe the British wished a revision of the Sevres Treaty with Turkey. Asked whether it would be necessary for the Greek Government to secure the return of Venizelos, in order that the country might avail itself of his ability, the King did not appear enthusiastic.

VENIZELLOS RETIRES.

ATHENS, Jan. 12. Former Premier Venizelos will not return to Greece, even if he should be recalled by Constantine, declared M. Simos, who writes announcing the withdrawal of Venizelos from public life.

## FALLING FAST.

DOORN, Jan. 12.

The condition of Augusta Victoria, former Empress of Germany, is becoming steadily worse, according to an official statement issued by her physicians.

## SUNK "RED" TRANSPORT.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 12.

French destroyers have sunk a transport carrying Red troops, apparently to Trebizond, says a despatch received here. The encounter occurred ten miles west of Novorossiysk, where the sinking vessel, torpedoed by the destroyer Sakalava, was run ashore and part of the troops and crew escaped by swimming. When the transport opened fire on French destroyers coming within range its guns were quickly silenced by shells from the warships.

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## Slump in Freight Rates Expected.

It is expected that the next month or so will see a drop in the rates of freight, between this port and Halifax. Formerly the Red Cross and Furness Withy Co's steamers handled all the freight on this route, but at the present time besides the boats of these lines the Canadian Government Merchant Marine have the Canadian Sapper with weekly trips, the Federal Line have the Lady of Gaspe making fortnightly trips, whilst next Monday Farquhar &amp; Co. are running the Sable I. between Halifax and this port, giving a weekly service. Again the S.S. Manola of the Canadian Steamships Company is starting a service between St. John, N.B., and this port, which will take a quantity of freight that used formerly be sent via Halifax. With all these boats running in competition it is anticipated that there will be a slump in the freight rates between Halifax and this port in the very near future. It is reported that one of the Steamship Companies has already notified shippers of a reduction on next month's shipments but this could not be verified. Within the past week it is learned, freight on coal, between Sydney and this port, has dropped from \$6.00 a ton to \$4.00, a reduction of \$2.00 per ton.

## Snow Clearing.

The Civic Commission have quite a number of horses engaged hauling snow from Water Street to-day. Shopkeepers are causing the Council a lot of worry by persisting in throwing snow from the sidewalks to the centre of the street. This morning the inspectors took quite a number of names of guilty parties and they will be summoned. The Commission is determined to have the law re snow clearing carried out. Last year the Council's employees hauled some 30,000 loads of snow from Water Street and the Belt Line, and this year it looks as if the snowfall will be greater, so that the expense of keeping the streets passable will cost a considerable amount. Last year the cost of snow hauling to the City was \$6,000. Of this amount the Reid Railway Co. paid in as their proportion about \$2,500. So far this season no agreement has been made with the Reid Co., but the matter will likely be up for discussion at to-morrow night's meeting.
