Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-I note by the Daily News

All the above shows are judged by the rules laid down in the Standard of Perfection issued by The American Poultry Association, and the English bred Leghorn in no way conforms to the requirements laid down therein for show purposes. The Leghorn as bred in England is away off in type with much larger and coarser comb and wattles than is demanded on this side of the water, other points of difference being too numerous to go i to in detail.

The Leghorn in U.S.A. and Canada ferent Standard altogether to that used in England. It has much finer and smaller head adjuncts so as to render it more adaptable to the cold climates with less trouble from frozen combs and wattles, etc., and is really a great deal more symmetrical than the English bred bird.

From a production point of view the English type of bird will probably pay as well as those bred in Canada. the US..A. or locally, price paid for coundation stock being equal. The reeder of the English type bird will doubt, have more trouble with Jack Frost than those who breed along lines laid down in Standard of Perfection.
