

Home Cooking

(Miss Allen's favorite recipe for home-made white bread. A recipe which always comes out right.)

(All measurements level.) 1/2 cake compressed yeast (at night). 6 cupful water.

2 cupfuls scalded milk or milk and half water. 2 tablespoonfuls Crisco 2 tablesponfuls sugar. 1 teaspoonful salt. about 7 cupfuls flour.
