Suffice it to say, Sir, that the journey did give me great pleasure altho 'twas marred at its end by my wife, seeing how the wretch was glad to see me return,

but the real reason of it that she might extort more money from me to buy her presents for Xmas, altho I have given her money for this purpose on no less than 3 occasions. New Grenfell Executive

MR. ALFRED A. WHITMAN.

It is announced from New York that Mr. Alfred A. Whitman has been appointed Executive Officer of the International Grenfell Association, in place of Colonel Cosby, who has resigned to undertake work in Washington for the American Government.

Mr. Whitman is a Nova Scotian, with relatives in Halifax who are connected with fishing and shipping interests, but for many years he has resided in New York, recently resigning from active business connections in order to devote the balance of his life to work of a philanthropic nature. For the greater part of his business career, Mr. Whitman was a banker, but he has found time to interest himself in Church and social service work, being for over twenty years a Vestryman of St. Michael's and subsequently Churchwarden. He is a member of the Century Club and of the New York Chamber of Commerce, and has been a Director of the Board of Trade and Transportation. Mr. Whitman is described as a man of the highest integrity and principle, one who is admirably qualified by nature and experience to undertake the work of Secretary and Business Manager of the International Grenfell Association.

His headquarters will be at New York but he will pay visits, at regular intervals, to St. John's and the various medical stations north.

Railroad Tracks
Indirectly Cause
Death of AirmanCanadian Aviator, Whose Wrecked Plane Has Been Found, Was
Prize Winner.

BOSTON, Dec. 17.—Captain Mansel R. James, Canadian aviator, whose wrecked plane was reported to-day as having been found in the woods near Tarrytown, disappeared June 2, 1919, while making a flight from Boston to Atlantic City, N.J. A reward for information regarding him was offered by his relatives but nobody was able to claim it.

Capt. James in the last week of May, 1919, won a competitive flight from Atlantic City to Boston, a distance of 360 miles for a cup offered by the Boston Globe and a cash prize of \$1,000. On June 1, the day the winner of the competition was announced he started on the return flight.

On leaving the vicinity of Boston the aviator picked up the Boston and Albany railroad tracks instead of the New York, New Haven and Hartford line, as he had intended, and lost his bearings. He landed that night

in Tarrytown, purchased gasoline and renewed the flight next morning. With perfect weather conditions and a gentle northwest wind he took off in the direction of Great Barrington, intending to follow the railroad line from that point. He never was seen again. In the months that followed reports were received from many points that the wreckage of his plane had been found out but all clues

proved to be baseless. His uncle, Dr. J. F. James, of Saratoga, Ont., offered a reward of \$500 for his discovery dead or alive and the search was kept up for months. Captain James was 26 years of age and had served in the Royal Canadian Air Force.
