

ELECTION NEWS.

A convention of the Reformers of North Huron was held at Vaughan on Saturday. Mr. Peter Fisher was elected President of the Association, and Mr. J. M. Leet, Secretary.

It is said that Mr. Munroe, the present Tory member, shrinks from the contest with Mr. Casey and will beat an ignominious retreat.

It is believed that Mr. Angus Morrison will not be a candidate for the ancient borough again, but will be appointed to some permanent office—rumor adds, the Collectorship of Toronto, from which J. E. Smith is to be promoted to an Inspectorship of Ports.

Hon. Mr. Blake attends the Convention at Riversdale to-day, and tomorrow there will be a grand demonstration in his honour.

Speaking of young Macdonald's candidature in Cornwall, the Gazette of that town says:—His late father's warmest friends openly discourage the attempt. They say he is too young and needs ballast.

The Berlin Telegraph urges on the President of the Reform Association for North Waterloo to take such action as he may deem necessary to ascertain at once the mind of the electors as to who is to be the Reform candidate.

It is understood that Tom Ferguson will not be a candidate for Cayuga at the coming election, as he is said to have come to arrangements with Mr. Little whereby the former will represent Simcoe in the Local House, and the latter is to be the representative in the Dominion Parliament.

The Colorado Potato Bug.

This insect, sometimes called the Ten-lined Spearman, first made its appearance on the western shores of the Dominion in the year 1870. Previous to that time, Canada had been comparatively free from insects that effected to any great extent the general growth of the potato.

The appearance of the Colorado beetle is a single season, no less than thirty-eight million, three hundred and thirty thousand and larvae; and the larvae is terribly voracious.
