

MANUFACTURES IN INDIA.—The great manufacturing and commercial changes which the abundant and cheap supply of labour in India must make, continue to develop themselves. On the Hooghly, for ten miles below and thirty above Calcutta, large mills and factories for jute and cotton manufacture are numerous—many of them run exclusively by American capital, and it is said that scarcely a month passes when some wealthy firm or American speculator does not put on the market a new project that is eagerly taken up. The dividends have of late been enormous—in some cases seventy-five per cent. Already a paper mill near Calcutta makes a profit on shipping its products to England. It is difficult to foresee to what changes the progress of manufacturing industry in India and China, in connection with steam power and good machinery, may lead the world.

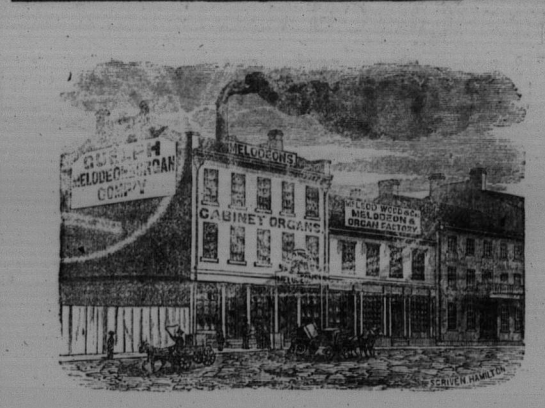

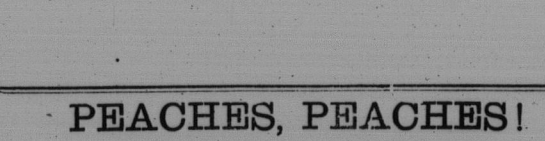
