In the Dining-Room.

THURSDAY, NOV. 11.

BREAKFAST—Grapes. Breakfast. Fast food. Fried potatoes. Cream gravy. Baked potatoes. Bread and butter. Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Stewed kidneys. Sweet potatoes, fried. Spoon corn bread. Baked pears. Tea or cocoa.

DINNER—Cream of celery soup. Stewed beefsteak. Creamed carrots. Mashed potatoes. Pain perdu.

Cut these recipes out and paste them in a scrapbook.

Fried Bacon, Cream Gravy—Cut the bacon very thin and fry on both sides until the edges curl up. Remove the bacon, keep it hot, and to the fat in the spider add one tablespoonful of flour and one-half pint of milk. Stir until very smooth, add three eggs well beaten. Pour over bacon.

Milk Bread—One pint milk scalded and cooled, one tablespoonful butter, melted in the hot milk, one tablespoonful sugar, one teaspoonful salt, one-half cup yeast or one-half yeast cake, six or seven cups flour.

Measure the milk after scalding, and put it in the mixing bowl; add the butter, sugar and salt. When cool, add the yeast, and then stir in the flour, adding it gradually after five cups are in, that it may not be too stiff; use just enough to knead it. Knead till smooth and elastic. Cover; let it rise till light; cut it down; divide into four parts; shape into loaves or biscuits. Let it rise again in the pans. Bake forty or fifty minutes.

For milk bread made with a sponge, use the same quantities, but add only three cups of flour for the first mixing and beat well. Let it rise about three hours; then add from two to three cups of flour, or enough to knead it free from the board; knead one-half hour. Let it rise in the bowl, and again after being shaped into loaves or rolls, and bake as usual.

Bread made up over night with a sponge should have only half the quantity of yeast used that is required when it is made up in the morning.

Bread may be made with half milk, half water, or all water. In the latter case double the amount of butter should be used and the sugar and salt.

Sweet Potatoes—Boil until soft, cut in slices and fry a golden brown in butter or drippings.

Maryland Spoon Corn Bread—Put one quart of milk on the fire, in a double boiler; when it comes to a boil stir in four large kitchen spoonsful of cornmeal and cook five minutes, stirring all the time. Remove from the fire and stir once or twice as it cools. When cool add three eggs well beaten with two tablespoonfuls flour, one tablespoonful butter, one scant teaspoonful salt. Pour in a greased dish and bake 35 minutes. Serve immediately with napkin around dish.

Stewed Beefsteak—Take two pounds of round steak, cut in five pieces, season with one teaspoonful of salt and one-half teaspoonful pepper and spread over them two onions chopped fine and

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 9.—Capt. McNeil, of the steamer Cranage, arrived in port this morning, and says that while passing in the vicinity of the wrecked steamer Idaho he observed two bodies floating, and that they seemed to have life preservers on. He reports that the lake thereabouts was covered with wreckage, and that the propeller seemed to be breaking up rapidly. The Cranage did not stop to pick up the bodies of the unfortunate men, but it is probable that there will be a tug sent there later in the week, under the direction of the Western Transit Company.

Oil Operations Western Ontario.

Prove Successful in Kent and Lambton.

One Well Producing Five to One Hundred Barrels a Day.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—The Ontario department of mines has received news from the county of Lambton, near Florence, about six miles north of Godswill. The news announces the discovery of another oil field where seven wells have been driven and one running from 5 to 100 barrels a day. Toronto capitalists are interested in the venture.

[Florence Quill.] During the past week the oil industry in Dawn township has awakened intense interest locally and investigation by experts from London, Petrolia, Port Huron and Bothwell. True it is that the first well, producing wells were struck. The first well struck was on the Smith property, and is called the Courtenay well, No. 2. Through the courtesy of Mr. Martin, sen., partner of Martin, Doran & Martin, a representative had the pleasure of seeing the well, and which proved to be a good one. This well is pumping 100 barrels per day. From Friday morning to Saturday evening (twelve hours of day) it produced 105 barrels. There are 25 feet of oil rock in this well. The oil rock and there are about 100 feet of oil in the hole. Pumping operations will be commenced today (Thursday). This well will sink another well immediately.

The Mawlin well, No. 1, is pumping 25 barrels per day. It is situated on the property of Mr. J. H. Mawlin, of Petrolia, have started drilling operations on the Tripp farm. At the Thomas well, No. 3, McClellan property, indications for a good well are favorable.

INCANDESCENT GAS. The Illuminating Powers of the New Discovery Are Intense. Washington, Nov. 10.—Consul Deuster, at Creffield, reports a discovery made there, which, it is said, will revolutionize the method of illumination. It is an incandescent gas. A single jet of ordinary size can emit light of much more than 1,000 candle-power, and fine print can be read at a distance of 100 feet.

The inventor says that the cost of a light of 1,500 candle-power is only 4½ cents per hour, while that of an ordinary electric light of 400 candle-power is 14 cents per hour.

FIREWORKS EXPLOSIONS. Two Men Hurt at Hand & Co.'s Factory, Hamilton.

Hamilton, Nov. 10.—There was an accident at Hand & Co.'s fireworks factory Monday afternoon. That no men were killed is marvelous. There were two terrific explosions, which shivered the walls of the factory. The firm has a number of small shanties in which highly explosive powders, etc., are handled in the work of preparing articles of pyrotechnics. It was in one of these that the first explosion took place. Fred Marks was mixing high explosive powder, and it was a report and the shanty was blown to atoms and Marks was in the midst of the flame.

Another employee, named J. Powell, was at work in an adjoining shanty, and as soon as he heard the explosion he ran out. He was badly hurt, his shanty was blown up, the explosion being caused by the concussion from the first. It is supposed, flying wood struck him on the head, and he fell down; but he was not hurt nearly so badly as Marks, whose face, hands and arms were severely burned.

Sgt. Robinson happened to be near the place at the time, and all the fire apparatus was quickly sent. The flames had been extinguished by the workmen before the firemen arrived. Marks is not supposed to be seriously injured. The loss to Hand & Co. is very light.

Large Shipment of Cheese From Tavistock to England—Fatal Sequel to a Cown Hunt.

The C. P. R. will build a new station at Woodstock.

A wealthy farmer named Boynton went to Chatham on Saturday from Wallaceburg, and went home minus \$500, which he either lost or was robbed of.

Yesterday N. H. Stevens, proprietor of the Kent mills, put through the largest draft ever handled by the Chatham banks. It was for \$50,000—Chatham Planet.

In Detroit on Saturday Sarah Jane London was granted a divorce from Dr. John Colby London, to whom she was married in 1885 at Blenheim, Ont., on the ground of cruelty. They have one child.

At Wallaceburg public school leaving entertainment on Friday last, the proceeds amounted to \$75.90 clear, which amount will go on payment for the new piano purchased recently by the school.

A large barn belonging to Dawson, near the station at Tavistock, was burned Saturday night, with all its contents, including this season's crops. Loss about \$2,000.

Auctioneer Irving, of Woodstock, says there is a decision in the farm sale business just now, and he attributes it to the fact that the farmers are in a much better position financially than they have been for some time past.

Last week Agent M. Gibson, billed from the Dover station at Tavistock 335 boxes of cheese from the Strathallan factory. The destination was London, England, and they were purchased by Ballantyne & Sons. Their total weight was 76,200 pounds.

The milling company of Tavistock are running their flouring mills day and night in order to meet the demand from the Maritime Provinces. Four carloads of flour have been shipped this week, and there are three cars ready at the mills as soon as cars can be obtained.

Chief Justice Meredith has annulled the interim judgment of Judge Hughes, of St. Thomas, to Michener, of that place, to prevent the town council from proceeding with the raising of a by-law in connection with the purchasing of a new site for a city hall.

The Verity Company of Brantford have made a proposition to the city, if the city will give them \$10,000 for the buildings in their present state they will accept the amount and rebuild. It would take about \$5,000 to repair the buildings. The city must hand over the money without submission to the people.

Mr. E. R. Almas' sales during the past week have been very satisfactory. At his home Saturday from 10,000 for the flock of sheep on Thursday night, when 18 were run over by a C. P.
