The majority of the new Ministers at Ottawa were re-elected by acclama tion when they returned to their constituents this afternoon.

Mr. C. C. James, Duputy Minister of Agriculture for the Province of Ontario, has received a letter from Mr. Watson, curator of the Imperial Institute at London, England, asking for the names of Canadian exporters of tinned ox tongues. Several English and German firms wish to import from Canada, and are seeking information regarding the industry here. To be Treated as First-Class Prisoners

-Jameson Surprised. London, July 30.-It is announced that Sir Matthew White-Ridley, Secretary of State for Home Affairs, has ordered that Dr. Jameson and others convicted with him for the Transvaal
