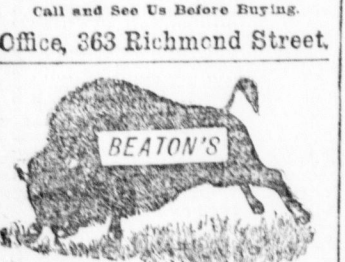

trough of low pressure mentioned yester-

storm now over Florida, which has moved

from the Atlantic. Pressure near the

normal now prevails over the lakes and

eastern districts. The storm over the far

west has spread over the whole Northwest

Territories, causing high winds there.

A Quarter Century's Work.

The characteristic feature of the annual
thank-offering meeting held yesterday
afternoon in connection with the Woman's
Foreign Missionary Society of the Park
Avenue Presbyterian Church was a paper
on the evangelistic work done in Trinidad
during the past 25 years. This was read
by Miss Kennedy. Her treatment of the
subject showed deep research and compre-
hensive knowledge. Gospel-spreading
enterprises in the island have been ex-
ceedingly successful. One evidence of the
progress made is seen in the fact that while
a quarter of a century since there was only
one school established, attended by four
children, there were at present in opera-
tion 54 educational institutions patronized
by thousands of scholars. Mrs. Albert E.
Cooper, of St. Andrew's choir, and Miss
Beattie Evans gave well-appreciated vocal
selections. Mrs. John Cameron offered a
few remarks bearing on missionary en-
deavor, and took part in the devotional
exercises. The "thank offering" collection
amounted to over \$41.

Canadian Poultry at Chicago.

Canada has no cause to be ashamed of the
exhibit which the Ontario poultry raisers
have sent to the World's Fair. This city
had been made the collecting point, and
from all parts of the Province valuable birds
were sent here for further shipment. Last
night seven cars, containing 1,187 samples,
were set in locomotion. On the 16th inst.
the judges at Chicago will commence their
work. Ontario's contingent of fowls will
comprise nearly half of the whole exhibit,
and will be placed in competition against
the rest of the world. Those who saw the
exhibit at the C. P. R. freight sheds yester-
day went away convinced that there was
no need for apprehending an unfavor-
able result from the result. Never before
in the history of the country has such a
collection of poultry been seen. The Tor-
onto district alone sends 300 under the
supervision of C. J. Daniels, while Lon-
don's environs will be represented by 500.
The latter will be looked after by Messrs.
William McNeil, R. Oke, D. Rogers, L.
Griffiths, J. L. Jarvis and John Saunders.
A. Bogue, of this city, was the general
superintendent. H. Wade, of Toronto, was
to see that the cars were passed the customs
at Detroit.

METHODIST MISSIONS.

A Deficit of \$7,735 to be Provided For.
HAMILTON, Oct. 12.—The Methodist
General Mission Board resumed its labors
to-day. The estimates of the year were
considered and it was ascertained that
it was a deficit of \$7,735 to provide for. It
was decided to pay the amount this year.
Rev. J. Saunby wished to retire from the
mission work in Japan. His letter was re-
ferred to a committee. It was decided to
place \$1,000 at the disposal of the com-
mittee on constitution and finance for Rox-
ton Pond, one church. A committee on
the traveling expenses of the board was
appointed, and W. M. Gray was appointed
journal secretary. The consideration of
appropriations for West China and India
works took up the balance of the board's
time.

LOST BOTH LEGS.

A \$15,000 Verdict Against the Michigan
Central.
DETROIT, Oct. 12.—A jury in the Wayne
Circuit Court this afternoon gave a verdict
for \$25,000 damages in favor of Wm. W.
Ludlin, 7 years old, who had both legs cut
off by a Michigan Central train a year ago
last April in Springwells. The boy's foot
became caught in the guardrail, and before
he could extricate himself the train backed
down upon him.
