Washington, Aug 1.-The persons best informed as to the probabilities declare that the answer of the Spanish Government to the terms of peace outlined by the government of the before Tuesday. Meanwhile, as an earnest that the United States Government has not inwar department yesterday for the dispatch of an entire Amy division to reinforce Generals Miles and Brooke in Porto Rico. This will be known as the provisional division, and will be commanded by Major-General Wade, at present in command at Camp Thomas, Chickamauga. He is ordered to turn over that command to Major-General Breckenridge, inspector-general of the army, and to report to Secretary Alger in Washington for instructions before departing for Porto Rico, bringing with him his adjutantgeneral and his aides. tation in the Porto Rico campaign of all the states. AGUINALDO DEFIANT.

Washington, Aug. 1.-A dispatch received from Admiral Dewey announces that Aguinaldo has assumed a bold attitude of defiance, and that it would take a large force from this country to subdue the insurgents. Without mincing his words, Admiral Dewey announced that there were strong indications that the Philippine insurgents themselves would have to be fought. Based on his depiction of the gravity of the situation there, it would take 150,000 soldiers from this country to cope with the insurgents throughout all the islands.

SHAFTER'S ROW WITH GARCIA. Washington, Aug. 1.-The war de-Gen. Shafter at Santiago de Cuba: "Have the Sun of Saturday, July 23, in which comments are made as to my treatment of Gen. Garcia. These two regiments were in the fiercest fighting at El Caney and San Juan, and won high praise for their courage and efficiency.

RAILWAY MEN DISMISSED.

Ottawa, Aug. 1.-Two dismissals from the service of the C. P. R. are recorded as a result of the collision near Pembroke last Sunday morning-Mr. Howard Moore, conductor on the local train that left here Saturday evening, and Mr. F. A. Tonnor, the operator at Pembroke, who failed to hold the Soo express. Conductor Moore carried a red signal on his train as far as Pembroke, which indicated that a special was following. At Pembroke he registered the special in a book kept for that purpose. Mr. Moore's offense is that he did not secure a receipt for this registration. It is claimed, however, on his behalf, that it has not been customary to ask for such receipts.
