Hon. J. Israel Tarte, Minister of Public Works, will be entertained to dinner by the officers of the 25th Regiment at St. Thomas tomorrow, on the occasion of his turning the first sod for the new armory in that city.

Straws show the wind. At the induction yesterday of Rev. Dr. McCrae into the Westminster Presbyterian Church, the former minister, Rev. Mr. Sawers, made incidental allusion to having on one occasion heard a fine speech from the late Sir John Mac-

donald, and within a week or two had also heard Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in one of the most brilliant speeches he had ever listened to. The allusion to Sir Wilfrid was received with tremendous enthusiasm and applause. Straws like these show the direction of public opinion.

Hon. Dr. Montague is announced as one of the speakers at the coming Conservative mass meeting in London. Perhaps he will explain to the electors why he let the charges made against him in 1896 by the Hon. Charles Wallace go by without taking any action. The trouble arose out of an anonymous letter written to the Conservative premier, charging Sir Adolphe Caron with having accepted a bribe of \$20,000 from the Montreal Belt Line Railway Company to promote certain legislation in the House. Hon. Mr. Wallace charged Montague with being the author of the letter, and sent a number of letters written to him (Wallace) by Dr. Montague, in company with the anonymous letter, to a New York expert, who pronounced the same Dr. Montague's handwriting.

Dr. Montague denied any connection with the letter, and proclaimed that he would at once have an investigation in the courts, but up to the present day that investigation has not taken place. Why? Let Mr. Montague answer that on Tuesday night, if he can.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell, as will be seen elsewhere, has broken out against Haggart, one of the nest of traitors! How unsafe to give over the interests of the farmers, wage-earners and manufacturers into the hands of a disorganized party which could not possibly present a stable government!

John Gilson, the Liberal standard-bearer for East Middlesex, an able and forcible speaker, will address a meeting in the East London Town Hall tonight.

One reason why Canadian industries have been so prosperous, and work plentiful, in the last few years, is because the present Government made a radical reduction in the duty on iron, a raw material that enters extensively into almost every article. Formerly, iron was taxed up to something like 50 per cent; now it is less than half that amount. The result is progress

and prosperity in every industry using it.

Mr. Rowell, the coming M. P. for East York, will be no mere Parliamentary bench-warmer. He gives notice that he will reintroduce the bill carried through the House of Commons by the late Mr. Bestman, M. P. for Center Toronto, for the legalizing of the union label, and will earnestly champion it. The measure, it will be remembered, received the support of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues, but was thrown out by the irresponsible Senate majority.

According to Hon. Mr. Fielding, Dominion Finance Minister, one of the signs of the times is:

"MEN WANTED."

This sign is to be found all over the country, and the consequence is that increased wages have had to be paid in many places to secure help. Newspaper correspondents say that everywhere this sign confronts the Opposition leader, and that when he sees it he turns aside, veils his face with his hands, as if in the attitude of secretly berating his luck.
