BRITISH TRIUMPHAL ENTRY. British Troops Get an Enthusiastic Johannesburg, Friday, June 1. - The entry of an armed force yesterday into this large, modern, populous town afforded such a strange contrast to the previous incidents of the war as to make the occasion peculiarly memorable. London, June 6.—A dispatch from Johannesburg, dated June 1, says that everything seems to indicate that for the future the war will be merely a police affair. Probably not more than 10,000 Boers are to the north. In conversation, before the Boers evacuated this place, Gens. Botha and Grobler indicated that they expected to confine the fighting hereafter to side attacks. The Standard and Diggers' News has ceased publication. The banks are still closed and little business is transact-Property has scarcely been touched, even where houses are un-occupied. Everyone seems to agree that Special Commandant Krause will be firm in preserving order. After the hoisting of the British flag yesterday in front of the government buildings, the day was devoted to jubilation.

WARREN'S LOSS. The casualties of the British in the fighting under Gen. Warren at Faber-sput, May 29, when with 700 men he was attacked by 1,000 colonial rebels, who were repulsed, included one man killed and ten wounded among the Canadian artillery. As cabled to the Associated Press, June 2, the total British casualties at Fabersput were 15 men killed, including Col. Spence, and 30 wounded.

Jubilation.

AT IT ALL NIGHT. London, Wednesday, June 6.—Eng land has been celebrating tonight, the fell of Pretoria very much as she did the relief of Mafeking, and long after midnight uproarious yelling, the tooting of horns and discordant chants ascended from the city streets, usually at such an hour as silent as the grave. All during the evening processions marched along the Strand, Picadilly and the other leading thoroughfares. In fact, so great was the crush that the easiest method of loco-
