

Toronto, Jan. 22. - The registrargeneral's returns show that there were 25,736 deaths in Ontario in 1901, among the 90 per cent of the population from whom reports were obtained, or 13.1 per cent, as compared with 25,382 in 1900. Largest number of deaths in any class was 2,286 from tuberculosis, compared with 2,360 in 1900. Diphtheria caused 512 deaths, as compared with 486 in 1900, and typhold 345 in 1901 and 550 in 1900. 

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
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
