The Grand Trunk Pacific.

The Grand Trunk Pacific contract has been clinched by a deposit with the Government of one million pounds and in the new one they greatly of Grand Trunk guaranteed stock. The strengthen their control, and are now contract called for cash or Government securities, and legislation will be required to confirm the change. Money is tight, and the promoters of the Grand Trunk Pacific, rather than pay the present excessive rates, have chosen to put up Grand Trunk, guaranteed stock, which is gilt-edged security, being quoted above par. The credit of the Grand Trunk Railway Company was pledged to the new enterprise to some extent by a guarantee of the second mortgage bonds on the mountain This deposit means that Grand Trunk credit is pledged to the extent of \$5,000,000 for the fulfillment of the entire contract. It is a matter for congratulation that the Grand system has placed its great power and resources behind the Grand Trunk Pacific. This moral and material support is an absolute assurance of the construction of the transcontinental road and its efficient operation. The opponents of the scheme will no longer be able to say, as they have been doing, that the Grand Trunk would assume no responsibility for the new road. The project will not be delayed by the necessity of new legislation to legalize the deposit. Surveying parties are active on the western section, and the work is being pushed with all dis-

An Absurd Theory.

Few Canadians will dissent from the statement that any overtures for rein the past and is no longer in a mood to ask favors which have been repeatedly refused and which she is now well able to renounce. Any commercial treaty with the United States, liable to be short-lived, is worth no concessions. To build up an export trade with that country, and to be suddenly cut off from the American market would seriously derange Canadian industry and commerce and force it to seek new outlets, which might

not readily be found.

One can grant all this without sharing the view that trade with the United States is absolutely valueless. The proximity of such a powerful and aggressive neighbor has political and military disadvantages, but it is preposterous to say that it is an economic evil. One would infer from the language of some Canadian newspapers and politicians that the existence at our doors of 80,000,000 people, who are lavish spenders, enjoying the highest standard of living, is a positive curse to this country. According to this theory it would be better if Canada were unhitched from the North American continent and towed to some isolated spot in the ocean as far as possible from civilization. How should we like to change places with the Fiji The countries whose products are dissimilar from our own are in tropical and semi-tropical regions, where the majority of the people wear breechcloths and live on what nature provides gratis. We might sell them cotton and buy from them bananas and cocoanuts. Where would Great Britain be without the markets of the United States, France, Germany, Russia, Holland and Belgium? Yet she manufactures nothing which these countries do

The great currents of trade flow between the civilized and highly developed nations of the earth, not between the civilized and the semi-civilized. They flow between countries in the temperate zones, not across the tropic of Cancer. If any man says the neighberhood of 80,000,000 people, with the greatest consuming power in the world is of no benefit to Canada, but rather a detriment, he is either insane, or, as Sir Richard Cartwright put it, he has some selfish object to serve. The Australian Elections.

The second general election for the new Federal Parliament of Australia took place this week. The Labor candidates made large gains at the expense of the Government party or protectionists, who are left in a decided minority on both the House of Repre-

bill passed the House, but the free traders controlled the Senate (also an elective body), and insisted on modifications. In the present election the Government, now led by Mr. Alfred Deakin, stood for the present moderate protective tariff, and the Opposition, o which Mr. G. H. Read is the leader,

for a low tariff. The Labor party degi'ed to take no sides on the fiscal 1. . . e, but to oppose the old parties ingiscriminately. In the last House the Laborites held the balance of power, in a position to dictate to any government that may be formed. In the new Senate they are also the largest party. They are frankly Socialistic and have impressed their theories on legislation

to a degree inconceivable in this country. Capital has taken alarm, and employers throughout the country have formed a federation to oppose the Labor policy, one feature of which is the discouragement of immigration. "Australia for the Australians" is the

battle-cry of the Labor party. The Government party before the election declared in favor of Chamberlain's policy. It proposed to grant a preference to the mother country by raising the duties against foreign countries, leaving the duties against Great Britain as they are. Mr. Read describes the Government's attitude in Dost thou not ever compel this scathing language:

."They wish to erect another tariff wall against the rest of the world and leave the existing wall against the poor old mother country, without taking a brick out. The mother country is to be allowed inside the outer wall, but she will find an inner wall against her, and will be left to wander round this blind alley under the impression that she is getting the Australian markets."

Mr. Read himself, and many of his supporters are lukewarm towards Imperial preferential trade, which is not compatible with their free trade theories. Just what bearing the result of the election will have on the Chamberlain propaganda is doubtful at this time, but the English press regards it as a postponement of any movement toward an Imperial preference on the part of Australia. The London Chroncle sizes it up as follows:

"The Australian workingman willingly accepts the advantages our fiscal innovators offer, but there is no whisper of any return. Much the same moral is suggested by the undisguised reluctance of Conservatives to refrain from in-creasing the rigor of the regulations giving the Canadian manufacturers monopoly in the colonial market.'
